DEAR FRIENDS,

You will be very glad to see the News-Letter again, and it comes with greetings and best wishes to you all, with thanks for the welcome letters and visits that have helped in the last two years to keep us all in touch with one another.

When the last News-Letter came out, our thoughts about the Hall were very anxious, and we have known some troubled times since then; but you will all be thankful to hear that things are looking brighter now. The Council of the School resolved last year to take a great step forward, and by their courage in enlarging the School, they have made it possible to look forward with more confidence to its continued existence and wider usefulness. Since the opening of St. Hilary House in Sussex Square in September, 1920, our numbers have risen to one hundred and fifty; and if they continue to increase, the solution of our hardest problem will have been found.

It would take too long to describe St. Hilary House, and the changes in the Hall which these two years have seen: and I will only ask you to come yourselves, as soon as you can, and feel how in its larger life the School is full of happiness and promise.

Your help is needed to make known that other girls can now be received, in addition to the Clergy Daughters who are on the Foundation.

Another House will be opened as soon as there is a waiting list sufficiently long to justify this step.

The two years have brought other changes, and among these has come one which leaves a very great blank at the Hall. You have all heard that Miss Waugh has been obliged to give up her work, and you have shared in our great sorrow at the parting, as well as in the thankfulness that is ours, for having been allowed the privilege of her life and work within the School for so long. Miss Waugh allows me to print in this Number a letter from herself, which you will all love to read: and to tell you that the sum presented to her was £114.

13TH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE S.M.H. ASSOCIATION.

The 13th Annual Meeting of the S.M.H.A. was held on Saturday, January 10th, 1920, at Beatrix House, Cadogan Gardens, London, S.W.

At 2.15 there was a short Committee Meeting, at which the following were present:—Miss Ghey (Chair), D. Cross, J. Newton, Miss Perry, Miss F. M. Potter, Miss H. R. Potter, Miss Thornburgh, and Miss Webster (Secretary). The Agenda for the afternoon was considered, and Miss F. M. Potter gave in her resignation from the Committee.

The general meeting began at 2.45, and 56 members, in addition to those mentioned above, were present. A message of loving greeting was sent to Miss Elliott.

The Minutes (which had been printed in the News-Letter) were taken as read. The President then reminded members of the help they could give by paying subscriptions promptly, and by keeping her duly informed of all changes of address and occupation, both of themselves and of their friends.

COMMITTEE.—A list of the existing Committee was read, viz.:—D. Cross, J. Newton, Miss F. M. Potter, Miss H. R. Potter, Miss Thornburgh, Miss Perry (Treasurer), and Miss Webster (Secretary), and it was reported that one resignation, that of Miss F. M. Potter, had been received. A very cordial vote of thanks was given to Miss Potter for her services.

Miss Ghey proposed that, as during the past year not much work had been exacted from the Committee, the same members should be re-elected, with one new member (belonging to about 1895 or later) to fill up Miss F. M. Potter's place.

After some discussion it was proposed by Miss Atkinson, and seconded by Miss Forrest, that the Committee should be re-elected, with power to co-opt other members if they thought good. This was carried *nem. con.*

Miss H. R. Potter gave a report of a small, but very happy, meeting held in the summer of 1919 at The College, Bromley, by the kind invitation of Mrs. Cross and Dorothy Cross.

The occasional sending out of Rogation papers from the Hall was discussed, and the feeling of the meeting was in favour of this being done.

The President gave some account of the financial anxieties which those responsible for the management of the Hall were facing, and mentioned proposals which might appeal to the support of Old Girls. The Trustees would greatly appreciate any effort made by Old Girls to gain help for the School.

The possibility of opening the School to daughters of laymen as Non-Foundation pupils was mentioned.

On the kind motion of Miss Thornburgh, a vote of sympathy was passed with the Head Mistress and all at the Hall in the difficult time through which they were passing. (ABRIDGED.)

14TH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE S.M.H. ASSOCIATION.

JANUARY 15TH, 1921.

The 14th Annual Meeting of the St. Mary's Hall Association was held on January 15th, 1921, at Beatrix House, Cadogan Gardens, London, S.W.

At 2 p.m. there was a short Committee Meeting, at which there were present Miss Ghey (Chair), D. Cross, Miss Perry, Miss H. R. Potter, and Miss Webster (Secretary). The Agenda for the afternoon was considered, and it was agreed to ask Mrs. Macfarlane if she would be willing to stand as co-opted member of the Committee.

The General Meeting began at 2.30 p.m.; 57 members, in addition to the Committee already mentioned, were present. After half-an-hour had been granted for conversation, the meeting began with prayer at 3 o'clock.

The Minutes were read and signed.

Miss Ghey read letters of greeting from Miss Elliott, Miss Ashwin, and Miss Wright. The last letter contained a suggestion for a S.M.H.A. weekend at the Hall during the Summer Term. Miss Ghey said that this should be kept in mind, though she feared it would not be a possibility this year.

Miss Ghey reported on events which had taken place during the year, and specially—

(1) The appointment of the Rev. M. Berkley as Appeal Secretary, his full time being occupied in preaching, arranging meetings, etc.

(2) The opening of St. Hilary's, the house in Sussex Square, bought by the Trustees in consequence of their decision to open the School to others than daughters of clergy, at the ordinary Public School fees. (Eighteen boarders and eight day girls had already been received.)

(3) The re-arrangement of the rooms of the School consequent upon this.

(4) The postponement of the News-Letter until this year, when a double number would be issued.

MEETING OF THE LONDON ASSOCIATION.

Miss H. R. Potter reported a very successful meeting of the London Branch at the Y.W.C.A. Headquarters, 26 George Street, Hanover Square, on Saturday, June 19th.

Miss Potter mentioned that the London Branch now numbered 62, and that the subscription had been raised by agreement from 6d. to 1s.

Miss Ghey moved from the Chair a hearty vote of thanks, both to Miss H. R. Potter and to the Raynors for all they had done to make the Summer Meeting so great a success. Miss F. M. Potter seconded, and the vote was carried with acclamation.

RAISING OF £14 BY D. CROSS.

Miss Ghey reported that £14 had been raised by D. Cross, through an original entertainment given by her and her friends on the Staff of Surbiton High School. This announcement was received with hearty applause.

D. Cross said that the performers would gladly do the Burlesque Pageant again in, or near, London for S.M.H. funds, and also would lend the words for others to perform it. She also spoke of ways in which she thought that Old Girls could help the Appeal Secretary, *e.g.*, by finding offers of pulpits and of hospitality.

SUGGESTIONS FOR NEXT MEETING.

It was agreed to adopt the suggestion that all those attending the next S.M.H.A. Meeting be asked to wear labels with their names and the years during which they were at the Hall.

LETTER FROM A. HAZLEDINE.

A letter was read from A. Hazledine suggesting the Alliance Club in Stratford Place as a possible place both for the Annual S.M.H.A. Meeting and also for lunching before it.

The meeting felt that arrangements for lunch would have to be made individually, and M. Seeley undertook to obtain all necessary information about the Club, and to pass it on to the Secretary.

PRESENTATION COPIES OF "THE ROAD."

Miss Ghey drew the attention of the meeting to several presentation copies of "The Road," which had been sent by the Editor, Miss Barton, and warmly recommended it to all who were present.

ELECTION OF COMMITTEE.

After some discussion, it was agreed that the Committee should be asked to stand as before.

Miss Ghey reported that its present members had decided to ask Mrs. Macfarlane to stand as co-opted member in place of Miss F. M. Potter.

Joyce Newton expressed her regret that she no longer felt able to serve, and nominations were asked for to fill her place. These were made as follows:

S.M.H.A. LONDON BRANCH.

The Annual Summer Meeting of the S.M.H.A. London Branch was held on Saturday, June 19th, 1920, at the Y.W.C.A. Headquarters (26 George Street, Hanover Square), at the kind invitation of Gertrude and Lucy Raynor.

In addition to our President, Miss Ghey, and the Hon. Secretary, there were 23 members present.

Miss E. Lovelock, an Old Girl, came as the guest of our hostess, and we also welcomed two former members of the Staff—Miss Parkinson, home on furlough from India, and Miss E. M. Clark.

The Hon. Secretary, in making a short statement as to the position of the Branch, reminded members of the decision agreed to at the Winter Meeting of the S.M.H.A., that members who left invitations unanswered for three or more years in succession should cease to receive invitations until they expressed to the Hon. Secretary their desire to have them. This step was rendered necessary by the low state of the Branch's finances, which now showed a balance of only 3s. 4d. It was consequently unanimously agreed, at this Summer's Meeting of the Branch, that the subscription for new members of the Branch should be raised to one shilling.

Miss Ghey then proposed votes of thanks to Gertrude and Lucy Raynor for their kind hospitality, and to Miss Webster for gaining for us the loan of the room from the Y.W.C.A. : and we then listened with enjoyment to our President's informal account of all the things about which we were most eager to hear, including the coming opening of 2 Sussex Square as a new House, and including also a reference to the sorrowful fact of Mrs. Thompson's departure from the Hall last Easter. The meeting unanimously passed an expression of its regret at her leaving the Hall, after so many years of faithful work there, and of its gratitude for all that she had done for the Hall and for its Old Girls.

The London Branch of the S.M.H.A. much enjoyed its informal Summer Meeting on Saturday, June 25th, 1921, at Kew Gardens, where the comparative shade and coolness proved a welcome retreat on what was one of the hottest afternoons of that amazing summer. It was a pity that so few were able to be present, in spite of the fact that the suggestion of Kew Gardens for our gathering had been so warmly welcomed at the Winter Meeting of the S.M.H.A.

We were grateful to Miss Ghey for sparing us a short time from her hurried visit to town, and for bringing us so closely in touch with S.M.H. achievements and S.M.H. hopes and plans. Miss Elliott again sent a much appreciated message of welcome, and a letter was also read from the Rev. Maurice Berkley, the S.M.H. Appeal Secretary, suggesting how old pupils might help Hall funds, as some have already done, by giving concerts or dramatic entertainments.

The Hon. Secretary of the London Branch gave, as in duty bound, a brief statement on finance, and reported a balance of 8s. 1d. in hand towards the expenses of the coming year. A substantial increase in the number of members is needed if the funds are to be sufficient to cover postal charges,

SCHOOL WORK, 1920-1921.

(For this please see Annual Reports.)

The Scholarship of £100 for three years, awarded by the North Riding County Council in 1920, to Joan Berwick for Classics, and the Open Scholarship of £25 for three years, won by Margery Dick for French at St. Hugh's College in the same year, deserve special mention. Joan Berwick also obtained First Class Honours in Classics in the Cambridge Higher Local, 1920, with distinction in Latin and Greek, and the Fletcher Prize for Greek Prose.

SCHOOL DIARY.

A diary extending over two years must needs be abridged, and Old Girls are asked to forgive the brevity of the present chronicle.

The event of the period under review has been the acquisition of St. Hilary House, No. 2 Sussex Square, which was opened in September, 1920. On November 24th of that year, the Rev. Henry Venn Elliott, assisted

by the Rev. B. Browne, the Rev. Canon Flynn, and the Rev. Canon Hensley, held a Service of Dedication for the new House, and in the presence of a large number of friends and members of the School, the Psalms read by our Founder long ago, when the Foundation Stone of the Hall was laid, were repeated, and St. Hilary's own Latin Hymn was sung.

On April 13th, 1920, Margaret and Nina Standage and some of their friends most kindly gave a Concert at Banbury, in aid of the Foundation Funds of St. Mary's Hall. A most welcome gift was received as a result of this kind effort.

The U.G.S.M. received £21 in 1920, and £18 in 1921 as the proceeds of small Sales and a French Play, scenes from *Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme*, acted with great spirit by Form VI.

On June 30th, 1920, an imposing Guide Rally took place on the County Cricket Ground, Hove, and the St. Mary's Hall Company thoroughly enjoyed the afternoon. H.R.H. Princess Louise reviewed the Guides.

July 2nd, 1920, was celebrated as Founder's Day, when (reversing the fortune of the previous year) XI. Daughters vanquished XI. Fathers on the cricket field.

On Founder's Day in 1921 there was not a public gathering, but after the Early Celebration in St. Mark's Church, the School spent a radiant day in Arundel Park.

Swimming was carried on with great ardour throughout the summer of each year, and the School possesses a large number of very good swimmers.

On December 1st, 1920, Miss Lawrence of Roedean presented the prizes, and addressed the School on the heritage won for the girls of the present day by the pioneers of women's education.

On December 19th, 1920, the School gave a Carol Concert in aid of St. Dunstan's.

On January 30th, 1921, the School had the pleasure of a brief visit from Bishop Stileman, late of Persia.

On February 16th, 1921, Mr. Hind Smith showed some delightful slides, and told the School of the work of Dr. Barnardo's Homes in Canada.

On April 30th, 1921, Mr. Adrian Harley delighted the School by his Lecture Recital of *The Merchant of Venice*.

From May 11th to 13th, three Board of Education Inspectors were with us, examining every portion of our activities.

On May 18th, Miss Hulburd again kindly judged the Drill Competition, and the trophy was won by Form VI.

On June 21st, the School had the great pleasure of a visit from Sir Mackworth Young, whom it was a delight to see again.

On July 20th, Form VI. performed an original pseudo-Greek tragedy, entitled *The Plough*, and realised as the happy result of their efforts the sum of £4 4s., which was sent to Miss Walters, as our first contribution towards the Sixth Form Bursary for the Working Women's College at Beckenham. During the year two Students of the College have given us the pleasure of a visit.

On October 29th, 1921, a most successful Sale for Foreign Missions brought in the record sum of £37.

On November 2nd, 1921, Lady Cunliffe addressed the School on the work of the G.F.S.

Prize Day, 1921, was held on November 23rd, when Mrs. Woods of Peterborough most kindly distributed the prizes, and addressed the School with a stirring speech on *The Adventure of Life*.
