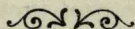

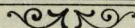

## ST. MARY'S HALL ASSOCIATION.

The Twenty-third Annual General Meeting of the Association gathered this year at St. Mary's Hall, kindly invited there by Miss Ghey, in order that it might combine with it the dedication of the gift Entrance Door to the memory of Miss Norah Waugh, and that we might have with us Miss Ghey at the meeting.

A Committee meeting was held at 2.10, and there were present:—Miss Ghey, in the chair; Mrs. Coad, Hon. Secretary; Mrs. Macfarlane, Hon. Treasurer; Mrs. Cunnew, Editor of News-Letter; Mrs. Barton, Miss H. Potter, J. Suthery and W. Hopley. The Agenda for the General Meeting was discussed and arranged.



The Annual Meeting followed at 2.45, opening with prayer and a word of welcome from Miss Ghey.

*The Minutes* were taken as read, and confirmed.

*Business arising from the Minutes.*—Satisfaction was expressed at the earlier issue of the News-Letter and at its management. A letter from Miss Bagley had drawn attention to the difficulty of marking with a cross at that earlier date (when perhaps the subscription had reached her, but had not then been paid in to Mrs. Macfarlane). In future, it was decided, Miss Bayley should receive and mark, if necessary, the News-Letters of those from whom she collected.

W. Hopley reported on the funds for the Memorial Entrance Door—paid in by subscription, £57 16s. 6d.; paid out, £53 12s. 0d., shewing a balance of £4 4s. 6d.; but the inscription tablet had yet to be paid for. Promises of one or two subscriptions had yet to come to hand and it was hoped the amount needed would be made up. A. Hazledine promised to write to one or two whom she thought would like to give. A vote of thanks to the Memorial Sub-committee was given, proposed by D. Cross, seconded by R. Elwin, and put by Mrs. Macfarlane to the meeting, was carried with enthusiasm. W. Hopley responded in the name of the Committee, saying it was a work of love, and the memory of Miss Waugh an inspiration.

*Correspondence.*—Miss Ghey read letters from Miss Thornburgh, Mrs. Davis and Miss Snowdon-Smith of good wishes, and regret for absence.

*Treasurer's Report.*—Mrs. Macfarlane reported that though the balance sheet published looked very important, yet there was really only a small amount handed to the Treasurer. Twenty-six members had become "Life Members" and £130 had been invested; many subscriptions, too, had been paid in advance. The News-Letter, of course, was the biggest item of expenditure.

*Secretary's Report.*—Mrs. Coad alluded to the delightful week-end for Old Girls as the event of the year, held in the summer this year at St. Hilary's, and expressed the gratitude of all for the happy time made possible by Miss Wisdom, Miss Miles and the Staff. She then went on to say that she was giving up the secretaryship—a bombshell which was received with groans and much sorrow. Miss Ghey gave an appreciation of all that Mrs. Coad had done for so many years; her work would be impossible for anyone to surpass, but would be an inspiration and stimulate a successor to keep it in view.

*Secretary of London Branch Report.*—Miss H. Potter gave an account of the meeting held in June, when the decision was made to carry on, and that the meeting should be open to all; incidental expenses would be met from time to time by a whip round. She made appeal to all in London and wishing to attend to let the Secretary know beforehand. The deficit of 1/1½ was turned into a balance (12s. 9d.) by a collection of £1 1s. 8d. made at the meeting. Miss Ghey kindly undertook the duty of being hostess at the coming summer meeting.

*Editor of News-Letter* reported that it would prove helpful, she thought, in writing up the list of members their dates at the Hall could be added. She gave notice of 22 new members. Four had died, and two had resigned; ten or twelve had dropped out by default.

*Mr. Griffith's Letter.*—Miss Ghey read the following:—

The Governors resolved—

- (a) That a capital fund be instituted to be called "St. Mary's Hall Association Capital Fund," into which shall be carried all capital sums which can properly be used in reduction of the Debenture debts of the Hall, and the income of which should be devoted to the St. Mary's Hall Association fund.
- (b) That out of the general income of the Hall, interest at the rate of 5% per annum (until further order) on the amount from time to time of this Capital Fund shall be paid to or accounted for half-yearly to the Treasurer for the time being of the St. Mary's Hall Association.

(c) That all such capital sums as are referred to in class (a) may be paid off at any time.

RESOLVED—That the institution by the Governors of St. Mary's Hall of the " St. Mary's Hall Association (Capital) Fund " is hereby approved, and that the Governors be requested to arrange:—

- (ii) that this sum of £50 and the sums secured by all other debentures already or in future given up by members of the Association or otherwise for the benefit of the Association shall (except so far as any other method of investment or disposal may be in any case decided) be carried to that Capital Fund by way of loan from the Association repayable on six months' notice on either side.

This is to provide for a single fund into which all monies of those wishing to contribute for the benefit of the Association should be paid.

Proposed by Mrs. Owen, seconded by A. Hazeldine, and carried.

*Election of Officers.*—The Hon. Secretary resigning, W. Hopley was proposed by D. Gross, seconded by A. Hazledine. *Hon. Treasurer*—Mrs. Macfarlane, proposed by E. Hopley, seconded by Mrs. Cunnew, was re-elected. *Editor of News-Letter*—Mrs. Cunnew, proposed by Mrs. Langdale Smith, seconded by D. Cross, was re-elected. *Secretaryship of London Branch*—Miss H. Potter was re-elected.

*Election of Committee.*—It was proposed by Mrs. Macfarlane that the Committee, including Mrs. Coad, should remain in office another year; this was seconded by Mrs. Jennings and carried. Miss French proposed a vote of grateful thanks to be given Miss Ghey for all the work she has put into the Association. This was accorded with enthusiasm. A proposal that dates should be introduced to the list of members in the News-Letter, made by Mrs. Cunnew, and seconded by Mrs. Sturdy, was carried *nem. con.*

The Fifteenth Annual Meeting of the S.M.H.A., London Branch, was held on Saturday, 12th July, at 4, Bloomsbury Square, W.C.1, Miss Ghey acting as hostess. June is the customary month for the reunion, but in June of this year Mary Ostle was away on holiday. When at an Old Girls' Week-end you feel all the time how much Miss Ghey and the Staff are enjoying having you. When you reflect, you realize how very good of them it is, when they have just finished an exhausting summer term.

#### DEDICATION OF THE MEMORIAL DOOR TO MISS WAUGH.

On January 18th, 1930, the Door and Memorial Tablet presented to the Hall by Old Girls and Mistresses and other friends of Miss Norah Waugh were dedicated to her memory in a simple and moving ceremony. A large number of those who loved Miss Waugh came together, her two sisters among them, and the whole household gathered round, in the entrance, along the corridor, and on the staircase, while Canon Meyrick, Vicar of Hove, and the Rev. F. Keeling Scott, Vicar of St. Mark's, Brighton, took the service. Canon Meyrick's beautiful words fell on the listeners like the very echo of the life we were commemorating:



"As I read the beautiful accounts of Norah Waugh in the St. Mary's Hall Magazine, I was at once reminded of one of Blake's most mystic pictures. There Christ stands with one hand reaching heavenward, the other shadowing the earth.

"That was Norah Waugh's attitude. Hers was that double reach. With one hand she reached out towards Truth, Beauty and Goodness. And these are the very garments of God. She loved colour and life. God is life and with Him there is no darkness; all is light and colour.

The other hand reached downwards—first to her pupils—how she understood them, encouraged, and inspired them! But beyond the walls of any college or school was the great world crying for help. The Industrial Christian Fellowship striving to unite factory and church, eager to crown Christ King of all; and the League of Nations helping us to live at peace; and the World's Call claiming Christ for all and all for Christ; these great causes appealed to her. Because she had one hand in God's hand, she could put the other into the child's hand, the friend's hand, the hand of the outcast, and the hand of the heathen who knew not yet the love and the light of God."

So we were helped to feel a new hope and a new inspiration for all our goings-out and comings-in; and that presence which had shown to so many the way to a new life seemed almost to be there in reality as the lovely words brought her back.

### AUTUMN TERM.

### "SHE STOOPS TO CONQUER."

It is the first time in the history of the School that a small House has ventured on so ambitious a production. Hervey deigned us a glimpse of her talent in the "much too short" play of last year. But even with this sample in our minds, we had not thought it possible for any three roofs to shelter such a store of genius!

Miss Smith as stage-manager and costumier was a revelation even to those who know her best. We congratulate her and her helpers on the beautiful dresses they left to the Acting Cupboard.

Mary Milne made a bewitching Miss Hardcastle, and spoke and moved as if she felt quite at home in her old-fashioned surroundings. Mary Edwards, as the young Mr. Marlow, was pathetically bashful in her presence; we welcomed the transformation when the "barmaid" appeared and Mr. Marlow was able to speak out without reserve.

Hope Lambrick made an admirable country gentleman and an ideal father. We cannot say that we would welcome Mrs. Hardcastle in as near a relationship! There is, alas, no space wherein to extol each character separately. But the acting was consistently of such high quality that Hervey may be allowed to boast of an all-star cast.

The prompter's silvery voice had little occasion to assert itself, but we congratulate its owner upon her help behind the scenes. Long may Hervey continue to flourish as a Dramatic Company! The sooner their next play comes off, the better pleased will be the School.

### " MILESTONES."

The School had been looking forward with great excitement to the performance of Arnold Bennett's play, "Milestones," by Snowdon-Smith. Unavoidable delay merely increased this pleasant anticipation. Nor were we to be disappointed.

The "Milestones" are 1860, 1885 and 1912. In each generation ambitious Youth defies cautious Age, which has forgotten its own fiery words of twenty-five years before. Yet the characters are individuals, not types, and show their separate personalities by the way in which they tackle circumstances. The cleverness of the play lies in words rather than in plot. This was brought out admirably by the actors.

Mary Newman acted well as hard, selfish John Rhead, the chief part. His amorous gaze at the pensive Rose (M. Briggs) was most convincing. He also changed his voice and manner skilfully with the passage of years—though not his suit. The character who most demanded our sympathy was Gertrude, and through Joan Eastham's splendid acting she got it. Perhaps we should here congratulate her "voices," particularly the cracked one. Margaret Briggs played Rose Sibley consistently and well. Girl, wife, and old woman, equally charming in different ways, were all one personality. What we could see of her old-fashioned brother, Samuel, above his collars, suited his part as well as did his acting and his sonorous voice. Joan Briggs acted an extremely difficult part, that of Emily Rhead, with considerable success. We could not tell whether we hated or pitied her more in her troubles. Arthur Preece (Margaret Gray) was exasperatingly full of his own invention and importance, and wore a tie that matched his views. It was a straight part and well acted, particularly in the last act. One minor character which deserves special mention was that of the Honourable Muriel Pym. Esme Stewart entered into it with a vigour which took her audience with her. Last but not least were Ned Pym, and Nancy Sibley. These were pure comedy, and at each remark got outbursts of laughter and applause from the audience. When "the donkey" became "a beast of burden," the heated utterances of the other characters stood out more sharply in contrast to his fatuousness. It has not yet been found out definitely whether Pat Reeve and Jean Menzies were made for the parts, or the parts for them.

In all its clever wording the play had also a more serious aspect. Although this could not fully be appreciated, it was not lacking. In the third act particularly, the house was entirely sympathetic.

The producing, clothes and scenery had been done with the care which is the making of a successful performance. Altogether, Miss Galton and Snowdon-Smith are greatly to be congratulated. The superior critics who considered that such a play was a little beyond the powers of a school caste must admit with John Rhead that "We live and learn."

### " DADDY LONGLEGS."

On Monday, July 21st, St. Hilary gave a performance of "Daddy Longlegs." Grace Boxley, as Judy Abbott, aroused our enthusiasm both as the orphan and as the young genius with the unexpected (and sometimes alarming) tongue. Daddy Longlegs, Gillian Watts, the "elderly" trustee and mysterious guardian of Judy, excited everybody's interest and sympathy in his delicate task. The crabbed and acid Mrs. Lippett, of the rustling black silk, made us feel thankful that we were not inhabitants of the John Guer's Home and had not to suffer the blue checked gingham and red flannel petticoat of the noisy crew of orphans. Joan Prichard, as Miss Pritchard, made an



excellent kind but elderly friend, Jimmie McBride, in other words. Peace Beevers, the breezy young Yale undergraduate, reduced us to helpless laughter, while Monica Luffman made an excellent Mrs. Semple, with her keen interest in other people's conversations over the telephone.

The whole play was brilliantly stage-managed and made a very successful ending to the term.

### THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

The Historical Society has flourished throughout the past year. There are now 29 members, to compare with the 19 members at the beginning of the year.

Meetings have been held on various subjects of contemporary interest, notably, the activities of the League of Nations, the Naval Conference of 1930, and the political situation in India to-day. We were honoured, in the Christmas Term, by a visit from Miss Ghey. She told the Society something of what she had seen and heard at Geneva, describing among other things, the laying of the foundation-stone of the new Palais de la Société des Nations.

We were bereft of our Secretary, Hope Lambrick, at the end of the Spring Term, and Mary Newman and Joan Eastham were elected as joint secretaries to fill the gap.

The Society would like to take this opportunity of thanking Hope for all that she has done for it; and at the same time would like to thank the new President for the interest and zeal with which she has directed its activities throughout the last year.

### LADY ELLIOTT.

Alice Louisa Lady Elliott died on March 8th, 1930, at her residence at Wimbledon Common, after a long illness, at the age of 84. She was a daughter of Mr. Thomas Gaussen, of Bank Moor, Belfast, and afterwards of Guernsey. In 1870 she married Mr. T. J. Murray, Indian Civil Service, of Enderrerry, Ireland, who died in 1885, leaving three sons and two daughters. The eldest son, Major T. F. Murray, of the Highland Light Infantry, was killed in France in 1914. The second son, Mr. E. W. Murray, was lost in the wreck of the *Stella*, off the Casquets, in 1899. The third son is Lieutenant-Colonel A. G. Murray, of the Indian Army, now holding the post of Controller of Military Accounts. Her elder daughter is the wife of Mr. Frank Elliott, Assistant Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis, and the younger is the wife of Mr. C. A. Radice, formerly of the Indian Civil Service.

In 1887 she married Sir Charles Elliott, K.C.S.I., who was Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal from 1890 to 1895, and who died in 1911. There was one son of the second marriage, Mr. Claude Elliott, who is Fellow and Tutor of Jesus College, Cambridge. Lady Elliott left a great reputation in India as a charming and witty hostess, which was maintained when Sir Charles and she settled after their retirement at "Fernwood," Wimbledon Park.
