Please DO NOT share the password with anyone who is not a member – if you're asked what it is, please refer them to me © We welcome your feedback on the site so do please have a look around!

Lis and her husband spent 8 days in the UK in February visiting relations and friends scattered from East Sussex to Staffordshire. This (including the drive to Calais from the Loire Valley before arriving in England) would be enough for most of us but not "our Lis"! The **Management Team** met by FB messenger voice-call on 7<sup>th</sup> March and our meeting led to outcomes which directly affect each member of SMHA so please read on.

Firstly, this is your **final e-Newsletter** but by no means the end of the news. Feedback has been reducing and we have serious doubts as to how many of the 1000+ circulated are actually being read (based not least on comments in the Virtual Common Room and in emails received). The work involved in creating it is, frankly, outweighing the discernible benefit to members.

We discussed **LinkedIn** at some length. It has now been agreed that as we are unable to facilitate it and those members who have signed up to it are not utilising it we will no longer promote it. An announcement on the group will refer people to our website. We would have preferred for it to continue – but properly administered! Feel free to volunteer...

Running Costs and Fundraising were discussed. We keep costs to a bare minimum – other than paying the annual examination fee for the accounts (which is now a lean £50 down from well over £100 in previous years) it is solely the running costs of our essential website which have to be funded. These have also been significantly reduced as a pleasing side-effect of changing platforms to an easier hosting system. With members' help in occasional printing and postage and your generous support of the 100 club, in a year with no other expenditure we can easily break even. However for the last year and in 2020 to an extent we are spending on scanning and photographing items for the website. We have spent more than our income and will do so again this year. We agreed that now that the website has been completed no future project should take place unless it was funded through donations or could be clearly identified as of benefit to a majority of members.

Wonderful news that we have sourced a member to join our Team specifically to assist our Finance Officer by learning how the accounts work and to act as second signatory / online authority. This relieves me of a huge 'burden' as accounts are NOT my thing (I manage my own very well but have not enjoyed being 'fall-back' to our wonderful Sian. Paperwork not complete yet, but we will reveal all shortly on our website / in the Common Room!

We have also found 'partners' for the last two members with no internet access to whom we write, annually. This is thanks to seven or eight individual members who have kindly offered to contact our list of otherwise excommunicated Old Girls with news by phone, letter or through a visit. Thank you so much all you lovely Girls who have volunteered to do this; it is greatly appreciated by the Management Team, and by those with whom you are keeping in touch.

A tiny team — all volunteers and all with other interests and commitments — cannot give more than we are giving and indeed we are having to make hard decisions about doing less. We therefore ask you once again to consider if you can step up and offer some small assistance? Please bear in mind that three of us are now in our 'Golden Years' as the Spanish so beautifully put it, and at some point we will have to STOP. At that time, unless others have already come forward to learn more about what happens so will the Association. You may be happy about this — you may not. We don't know that...but we would be interested to hear!

As a later item puts it, the aim of SMHA was that "it might become a real help both to past and present pupils, as a link to join the old pupils together." This is the simple aim still borne in mind by your Management Team in everything we do, but to go on doing it in our second decade of virtuality we need your support and engagement.

I hope you enjoy reading the news and articles and looking at the photos in the rest of this spring e-Newsletter and that you will remember to check in regularly to the Latest News (link) especially if you're not a member of the Common Room.

Sarah Robinson (Burgis, 1947-52) saw the scanned newspaper cuttings of the Founder's Day gymnastic displays & parade in the winter e-Newsletter and sent me this email:

"Here is some more news (or should I say ponderings?)

I was at that Founders day as I joined SMH in 1947. I would have been very junior, so possibly at the back of the parade. I do remember doing a demonstration with other girls of the Western Roll high jump. And some of the girl's names are familiar. Penelope Burgis was my sister; she passed away many years ago.

I still have my form reports and reading them again I realize that my schooling and the reports would have been very different if they had known about dyslexia then. But I did excel at art and in 1952 and 1953 won bronze then silver star for paintings sent to the Royal Drawing Society's Exhibition "The Children's Royal Academy" Miss Conrady was headmistress then and I was one of the girls she was unpleasant too, so I got very little praise. Miss Robinson was a wonderful person strict but fair. I was very sorry to see her go. Those last few years were horrible and I could not wait till I was 15 and could leave. I then went to art college and when I told Miss C she couldn't hide her disgust during the goodbye in her study. And I am still an artist and craft worker!"

I investigated the 1953 Newsletter and found an extract from Miss Conrady's report which shows that although she had not been able to show Sarah how proud she was of her achievements she clearly <u>did</u> value her contribution to the school, mentioning her prizes and sharing that she had visited the Children's Academy to see Sarah's work on display! Sarah is pictured here, (taken from 1949 'long school photo')



Lis' mother, **Ruth Ferguson (Powell, 1948-50)** has the original photos used in the newspapers so we have been able to scan these, obviously of a much better quality, and add them to the website. Thanks, Ruth!

While I was putting this piece together Lis re-discovered an Appreciation of the Life of Harriet Robinson (Head from 1945-49). I was very happy to be able to share it with Sarah and I know it will have stimulated lots more memories! ## The Good Companions – the story of the SMHA (transcribed from the Jubilee (50th) edition of the Newsletter – December 1948)

I wonder how many of the 1040+ current members of SMHA pause to think of our origins? **Lis Eastham** went to the trouble to transcribe, for our website, an article on this very topic penned by Miss H Potter, sister of a former Head. A shortened version of her article appears here. The whole item is on the website's "*Items of Interest*" page.

The widespread and helpful influence of the SMHA in the affairs of St Mary's Hall, shown most conspicuously during the temporary closing of the School, seemed to justify the choice of this moment in which to give some short account of "How it all began." The St Mary's Hall Association began life under Miss Birrell (my sister's predecessor as Headmistress or Lady Principal), who felt convinced that many Old Girls would gladly contribute a small annual sum in gratitude for all that they owed to their old school. In this she was ably supported by Miss Efie Elliott, the Founder's daughter, who became a subscribing member of the new Association. The first number of the Newsletter, under its original name of "The St Maryan," appeared early in 1897, giving the news of 1896. Its chief aim was to give Hall news to members of the Old Pupils Association, which at this stage consisted solely of members subscribing towards the funds of the Hall. A list of these subscribers appeared regularly in the annual report, but at first the only list to appear in the St Maryan was of members of the Prayer Union, a union fostered by Miss Birrell of members of the Old Pupils Association, who, with some of the Staff and a few outside friends, pledged themselves to pray regularly for those Old Girls and former mistresses who were engaged in missionary work abroad. The first list of members of the Prayer Union appeared in the 1898 St Maryan and the next year's number added the names and stations of the mission workers. Links between Old Girls and the Hall were thus already being forged, and these were strengthened by Miss Birrells's continuing, after her resignation in 1899, to keep in touch with her own former pupils who had left the school, urging them to join both the Old Pupils Association and the Prayer Union. Until her health began to fail she contributed a letter to each number of the St Maryan, addressed to all Old Girls and making the same plea. Miss Birrell was, in 1899, succeeded as headmistress by my own sister, who early realised that if the Association was to expand and grow, it must be something more than a mere body of subscribers; it is true that all Old Girls were invited to Founders Day celebrations every autumn, but they came then as individuals only. Helpful advice was again given by Miss Efie Elliott, and in 1900 the first Annual Meeting was called, being held in the Alliance Club, in Curzon Street. The News Letter (the old title of the St Maryan being definitely dropped) of 1908 gives an account of this meeting, at which the necessity was urged of so re-organising the Association "that it might become a real help both to past and present pupils, as a link to join the old pupils together and as a source of support, both spiritual and practical, to the Hall." The name of the Association was to be altered to "The St Mary's Hall Association", a more inclusive title now that former members of the Staff could be admitted as subscribing members. This meeting, at which 70 members were present, thus marked the beginning of the S.M.H.A. as we now know it. The earliest Committee had a President (the Headmistress) and an Hon. Secretary (an Old Girl), but for convenience in administration, the Hon. Treasurer was a member of the School Staff and the News Letter was sent out from the Hall. Contrast with this the imposing list in the latest News Letter, of 20 members of Committee in addition to the President, two Vice-Presidents (former Headmistresses), and others. It was by Miss Ghey's wish, soon after she became Headmistress, that the editing of the News Letter passed into the hands of an old pupil, and this provided another link between it and the S.M.H. Association.

The coming of the war reduced the size of the News Letter to an alarming extent, partly because of the restrictions on paper and printing, but chiefly because the Hall itself was "for the duration" of the war, not functioning as a school. News of Old Girls became its most important item, revealing the great number of those engaged in war work of many kinds. Though reduced in size, the Newsletter still clung to life – even cheerfully – firm in the faith that the Hall's renewal would not long be delayed. And through all the crippling years of war the St Mary's Hall Association increased in strength, taking up the task of keeping alive the "Idea" of the Hall. It met the Governors' appeal for a guarantee of monetary assistance, raising funds by many ingenious methods. Reward came when the Governors reported to the Association that its efforts had made possible the re-opening of the Hall in 1946. Recognition of the help given was also shown when, during the war, the Governors resolved that two members of the SMHA should be chosen to serve on the Governing Body of the Hall. Now that St Mary's Hall is in vigorous life once more, and increasing steadily in numbers and enthusiasm under the leadership of Miss Robinson, this concession will do much to keep the Association in touch with school events. Once more the News Letter will aid the good work by being able to include in its pages a diary of the school year, and once more will be able (after a decent interval) to welcome new "old girls" to its growing list of members of the Hall's own Association.

This email came into my in-box all the way from New South Wales, Australia, on 3<sup>rd</sup> January 2020.

"An extraordinary thing has happened today. What with all the commotion and preparations to possibly evacuate tomorrow because of the Currowan mega blaze moving northward along the coast toward our Shoalhaven Heads area, I had the most wonderful reunion with old SMH girl, **Lilian Cooper**!!! Only about 30 minutes, but fabulous, nevertheless!

Lilian was in Berry, NSW (a small town near our Shoalhaven Heads) for a very sad reason, the funeral of her husband Stephen's beloved sister who used to live in Berry. After the funeral Lilian and Stephen went to our local winery, the Coolangatta Estate, for the post-funeral reception/lunch.

Stephen's mother was from the Bishop family who own the winery, and he knows our area quite well. They had to return to Sydney today and needed to get going, to join all the rest of evacuating people travelling north.

Isn't it AMAZING that we managed to meet? We obviously never met at school because she's, I think she said, 55 now, and I'm 75. We all got along famously so she's hopefully coming back with Stephen for a longer visit. There was so much to say and so little time. We'll have to arrange for her to meet my sister Pam Bailey (Read-Jahn, 1954-59), and Penny Fitton (Hewitt, 1960-64), too."

We left SMH in 1985, or thereabouts but little had changed between us in 35 years!"

My time at SMH was spent running along corridors, but for the first ten years of my life I ran free and scratted on the seashore in the northwest Highlands of Scotland.

My parents built an adventure school in 1969 at Ardmore. My Dad has just rowed across the Atlantic Ocean. I lived with them on a remote croft with no electricity or television, perched on the edge of the Atlantic. When my parents decided to take part in a sailing race around the world other arrangements needed to be made and since my Gran lived on the sea front in Brighton and her kitchen window faced the SMH lacrosse pitch I was sent to SMH.

It was as if I had landed on another planet. Sarah, my best friend, and I met on day one in the gym, my Gran and her Mum held their cups and saucers nervously. Our uniform hung loose, our hair was held back with Kirby grips. We entered Transition class. I knew nothing of 'mufti' and 'tuck'. As junior boarders we lived in Elliott, laid out like a prison, but with nicer dormitories, candlewick bedspreads of various sludgy shades. We bonded through adversity and had great fun together. I well remember chatting after lights out and our illicit midnight feasts at the end of term when I always had to take the sliced ham. Sarah, an academic scholar, was brilliant at everything. She helped me with homework and partnered me for projects, (thank goodness). I loved sport, particularly lacrosse and tennis.

Whilst at SMH, my Gran took me to Wimbledon and I began to learn that anything could be possible, Tracy Austin was just five years older and a top seed. I wanted to do something amazing in my life.

I moved to a school in Scotland for A levels and spent more time cross country running and outside. After several expeditions to the Peruvian Andes, running the NY marathon, cycling in Morocco, I got the opportunity to train to be the first woman to kayak around the infamous Cape Horn, considered to be the roughest sea area in the world. We trained for two years and were by no means naturals.

I wrote a book about my life and the trip, remembering Mrs James's O Level English class "your punctuation and spelling leaves a lot to be desired, but if you write about something you know, you can write quite well"!

I always wanted to bring up my own children here at Ardmore and in my 30's this came to pass. I took my children to meet the school bus by open boat, we often travelled home across a black velvet sea loch leaving behind a trail of phosphoresce gazing skyward to spot shooting stars. Gales, snow and frozen loch would see us walking for 45 minutes to the nearest road.

I've now been running the adventure school for 20 years. The school itself has been offering adventure for all ages for more than 50 years. I love the place. We live on the westernmost edge of Europe with mountains to our east and the Atlantic stretching away to the west. We are at the mercy of the elements, we monitor the weather by watching three digital forecasts and our broadband reaches us by satellite. I order in gallons of milk, tens of loaves of bread and fresh food to feed up to 70 people during busiest weeks. Each summer we welcome around 500 young people aged 11 – 18 years old and some adult teams, between May to September, from UK, across Europe and beyond to Ridgway Adventure where they challenge themselves and have new experiences on land and sea. I feel it is all worthwhile... and I'm still running!

As I mentioned in the winter e-Newsletter, those of us in the Virtual Common Room spent a lot of 2019 chatting about "dhrahma" and, as promised, I have now compiled photos and memories from all sources into a piece for all of us to enjoy!

The main theme running through it is Dido and Aeneas since for reasons which no one has really fathomed this was performed over and over again in the latter part of the 20<sup>th</sup> century at SMH!

In 1976 Susan McDonagh (1969-76) recalled it was done in the summer with Vicki Campbell (Angus, 1970-76) as Dido and Margaret (can't remember her surname) as Aeneas with Angie Risley (Charles, 1969-76) as Belinda. "I had great fun stage managing the production as the choral society was used for chorus so you can imagine what it was like back stage with all those people around. Luckily we could open the fire doors so most of the chorus could go outside out of my team's way!"

Sian Spencer (Williams, 1966-76) "Remember it well, the summer of the drought every fan in the school employed to keep the harpsichord cool and I had to stand guard to protect it from damage! *Emma Gooden* was Aeneas and *Belinda Nobby Kentish* main witch. Happy days and very fond memories." Connie Sturt (Gamble, 1970-76) added that she was a witch and a sailor.

Jenny Child (1972-81) recalls "...two lots of performances in 1976 - the second one was where we understudies got a go. That production changed me. Leaning out of the dormitory window in Elliott House one stifling hot evening, long after the cast had been sent away to bed, just to catch the sound of those wonderfully intricate melodies floating down on the breeze from the hall, as Mr Avis rehearsed the orchestra. That is one of my most treasured childhood memories. I've been hooked on Baroque music ever since. Years later, I got to play the orchestral music myself in a Baroque orchestra, which brought it all back. Happy days."

**Lesley Clifford (1971-78)** was in the chorus of both Dido and Aeneus and also Orpheus and Euridice in the 70's. **Heather Hampson (Gillham, 1973-80)** remembered both. "I was completely overwhelmed in Orpheus and had to leave stage to sob in the gym changing rooms."

Lesley Clifford "... I did the same in my first (and last) ever ballet show in the 60's!"

**Nicola Sampson (James, 1965-71)** commented "I don't remember those productions but I was in Volpone at Brighton College and The Cherry Orchard at SMH in the old hall."



We had a ball being on stage a fair amount of time with no words to learn. Our French host family were lovely. On the night we arrived they took us on a drive through Paris to see all the illuminated sights. I shared a room with Terri (?) who played the spirit. I think she was in upper trans at the time

Mireille Dupire (Blass, 1982-91): "I didn't like my French family, and they had to move me in the middle of the night. They asked me where I wanted to go and I said "wherever Victoria (Miskelly) is". I was so lucky her host family would take me in!"

**Joanna Bane** "Happy memories. Had a great time in Paris. I stayed with *Emma Atkinson* at a French family's home."

Alison Platt (Schuller, 1980-87)'s photos\* (left and below) of 1986's Dido with Mary Barltrop (1980-87) as Belinda, Elly Maconochie as one of the witches and Victoria Johnson (Davis 1979-87) also Gerry Sayers (Royce, 1982-87) and Joanna Bane (Royce 1982-87), Claudia Duveen, Emma Shotts (Wills, 1982-88) and Victoria Claire (Miskelly, 1982-86), back centre! Catherine Hicks/Barnard (former staff): "That was a fantastic production! I remember the red ribbon entrails and everyone drumming their feet on the floor at the end! Stirring stuff!" Victoria Johnson "Oh the memories!! Particularly when we "travelled" with it. I still haven't got over it! I had a bed in the house of the family I was staying with that was about 2 feet too short and what felt like boxes put together as the base! So much fun though with everyone!"

Joanna Bane "and my sisters Heloise and Geraldine all loved being in the choir and especially enjoyed performing Dido and Aeneas in Paris. We were in the choir with the infamous Katherine Burt and Mary Barltrop! My twin and I both live up North now and Heloise is in America."

Katy Morrison (1991-97) recalls "We did another Dido in 1996 - by candlelight in the chapel. A Mr Jay production & it was amazing to be part of it. I was Dido & Nadia Bunker (Behdad, 1992-99) was Belinda & there was a lot of other singing talent. Didn't get to go to Paris though!" Nadia Bunker "loved that show! Fast forward to around 2012-2013, I was singing evensong at Westminster Abbey and I recognised the cantor's voice. When I looked up from my score, I couldn't believe it was Jamie Hawkey, who sung Aeneas for us - now Dr James Hawkey, Canon of Westminster!" Katy Morrison "YES! I saw him on TV a couple of years ago & couldn't believe it! He did have a beautiful voice." Trish Glasspool (Ireland 1992-98) and Kate Fleming (-99) also performed in it in 1996 as did Lucy Haverty (Ellison, 1992-98) who remembered that a boy from Brighton College was drafted in on that occasion, too.


It is "The King and I" with Louise Paddenburg (1988-98) front row 6 in peach turning sideways and her sister Katy Williams (Paddenburg, 1989-95) front 8. Lucy Haverty third girl in on the front row, pink dress. Kate Fleming remembered having to wash out the black hair spray and Hannah Greaves (Field, 1986-93) also said it took her ages to wash all the makeup off! Helen Fraser (Roberts, 1985-95) remembered Alice Rawdon-Mogg (1993-2000) (The King) changed just before the end putting on extra make-up and hairspray to look like everyone else — "which I always thought was pretty pointless as the King dies (oops, spoiler alert)."

Chris Ellison (1983-91), reading about Dido, was astonished... "They drafted in a bloke??? They didn't in Oklahoma and I had to play opposite Ado Annie!!! Although it did feature "Rog" (Mr Roser) who "never looked so comely as he did in those chaps! And Mr Wells scared me half to death as Judd!"

**Roger Roser** (former staff) commented that he had been "very scared doing this. Several years later I worked on another cowboy type show with **Olivia Beckwith (Lipscombe, 1993-97)**. I had great difficulty learning the lines and spent most of my free periods rehearsing with her when I should have probably been teaching someone else."

At the beginning of the Autumn term auditions were held for this year's school play, "Pride and Prejudice", written by Jane Austen and adapted for the stage by Constance Cox.

Once the play was cast the following weeks were spent learning the script; rehearsals were held and the play gradually began to fall together, mostly due to the dedication of the producer, Mr Wells, and thankfully little prompting was needed by Emma Collins, on the nights of the performance.

The story tells a witty and amusing tale, (with a happy ending) of a mother, who has to marry off her four daughters, so that there is a male heir in the family.
