HEADMISTRESS'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

We began the Autumn Term in buoyant mood, encouraged by excellent examination results at both GCSE and A level - and after twelve weeks of hard work and play, the term ended in a veritable whirlwind of activities! The Senior Christmas Concert was a most joyous occasion with which to begin the festive season. The Christmas story was beautifully re-enacted by the Nursery in their lively performance of 'It's a Baby'. This was followed by the delightful and moving presentation of 'Bells over Bethlehem' by the children of Gloucester House. In the last week, there were two Carol Services: Elliott House children accompanied choirs and congregational carols on a wide range of stringed, wind and percussion instruments; and on the final day of term the candlelit Senior Carol Service was, as always, a memorable way to conclude the term.

There have been many highlights this term. The Advent launch of the St Mary's Hall poetry anthology, 'Light Years', was a particularly outstanding occasion, marking as it did the culmination of two years of creative writing inspired by our head of English, Mrs Liz Fincham, herself a published poet. I was so grateful to the members of SMHA who were able to attend and participate in the launch. The anthology is a marvellous document recording thoughts, fears, memories, aspirations and concerns at the end of the millennium. It will be treasured by all who read it, but especially by the poets (young and old) featured in its pages, who are delighted to see their efforts in print.

Another memorable occasion was the 'Swim to France', in which the Houses competed to complete the distance in our own pool (not the Channel!) in aid of charities which are supported by each House: Cancer Research, RNIB, Leukaemia Research and the Royal Alexandra Hospital for Sick Children. Miss Whittaker, head of PE, organised the event superbly, and two girls, Kerrie Trembling and Simin Kiani-Lirhani, surpassed their wildest expectations by swimming 400 lengths each - which is five miles! Chichester House won the prize for completing the distance in the shortest time, and Year 7 competitors were awarded the prize for the year group which completed the greatest number of lengths. Their total was 22,560 metres. We are still counting the sponsorship money, but we are optimistic that we will be able to send handsome cheques to our chosen charities.

We were sorry to bid farewell to the congregation of St George's Church, which has been in exile in St Mark's Chapel while St George's crypt was being converted into a community centre. The clergy and congregation celebrated their return to their own church with a special service in the presence of the Bishop of Chichester on All Saints' Day. We are pleased that the link with St George's will continue, since our boarders attend Sunday services there, and Father Andrew and Father Colin are our School Chaplains. We also hope to set up a community service programme to involve Sixth Form girls in the work of the new centre. On their departure the church wardens of St George's presented SMH with a generous cheque which, combined with funds raised by the PSA, will purchase a much needed new carpet for the Chapel. In 1999, we were pleased to welcome our first Gap year student as a House Assistant in St Hilary. Nichola Chapple from South

Africa, was a most valued addition and greatly appreciated by the boarders. We have just welcomed her successor, Margot Carruthers, who joins us from Tasmania. Mrs Hazel Hawtin has taken over as Head of Gloucester House and led the department through a very successful Ofsted Inspection - quite an ordeal in her first term! Mr Adrian Sefton has been appointed as head of the Design Technology department, and Mr Neil Lockwood is teacher in charge of Economics.

We all congratulate Jo Podd upon her marriage to Jonathan Stubbs. The wedding took place in St Mark's Chapel in the Christmas holidays and was a real SMH celebration! It is not often that we have a member of staff, old girl and SMHA committee member getting married! The Elliott choir were spell-bound on the arrival of the bride, and it was a wonderfully happy occasion for us all. We wish Jo every happiness in her married life.

On a sadder note, I should like to pay tribute to one of my predecessors, Miss Doris Conrady, Headmistress of SMH from 1950 to 1965, who died peacefully on the morning of 8 February 1999 at Westerleigh Nursing Home in Seaford, aged 94. Several members of staff, Governors and SMHA attended the Requiem Mass to commemorate her life. Miss Conrady never visited the Hall in my time, but she appreciated being kept in touch with School events, to which she was invited right up to the end of her life. Miss Conrady took over as Headmistress at a time when the Hall was re-establishing itself after the closure during the war. These must have been challenging years, and in the Inspection report in 1962 the Hall was congratulated on its recovery, commenting that a 'first class staff had achieved wonders'. The School History reports 'St Mary's Hall contrived to do well under the guidance of a first-class Headmistress, its reputation stood high and excellent results were being achieved'. Miss Conrady's portrait on the stairs serves to remind us of a remarkable and dedicated teacher whose contribution to the Hall we remember with gratitude.

And so, here we are in the second millennium and the third century for SMH! Very different challenges lie ahead of us, and at the Hall we are striving to build upon the very best of the past, whilst adapting and responding to the demands of an unpredictable future and a rapidly changing world. Exciting times, indeed!

I do hope many of you will be able to join us at SMHA and School events in 2000, and in particular at the Grand Reunion on 13 and 14 May. We so enjoy your visits and reminiscences, so do keep in touch!

I should like to conclude my letter with lines from a millennium prayer written by Sarah Johnson in Year 9.

LETTER FROM PAMELA JAMES

Dear Friends

I am writing this letter in December and have been privileged to attend - and enjoy immensely, the end-of-term events at the School. The last of these, the end of the final day of term, was the Senior School Carol Service. It is, as many of you will know, held in the School Chapel of St Mark, by candlelight. At its conclusion, the whole congregation - Governors, pupils, staff, parents and friends - pours out of the church doors on the crest of the reminder we have experienced, in word and song, of the wonderful Christmas message. Last-minute cards, hugs and greetings are exchanged, and the Christmas holidays have really begun.

Mr Anthony Elliott, retired Chairman of the Governors and direct descendant of the School's Founder, Henry Venn Elliott, who was at the Carol Service, asked me whether it had changed much since I joined the School.

Thinking back, I remembered that at that time there was a service of Nine Lessons and Carols. My only direct involvement then, as head of English, was to rehearse the readers. They read in order of age, the youngest first, and I always thought how unfair it seemed that the youngest reader (an eleven-year-old) always had to read the lesson from Genesis - by far the most difficult. At that time the service took place at St George's, the whole school walking there in crocodile fashion.

Nowadays the School has its own Chapel. There are no longer nine lessons. In addition to the scriptures, poems tell the Christmas story. There is now an Advent ring, the lighting of whose candles adds to the story too, in its special way, and the Chapel is lit by candles, by whose warm glow we worship. But the carols and Bible readings are traditional, the message is the same. 'Evolution, not revolution', said Mr Elliott. His words summed up my feeling that we do always need to be moving forward, but at the same time to retain and hold onto what is good about the past, to provide the strong roots by which the future must be anchored.

It is with those sentiments in mind, appropriate surely for all we who are linked together by our connection with a school whose foundation goes back to 1836, that I wish you all a Very Happy Millennium (though **not**, as I was wished in a card from the United States, 'a very happy millennium and many, many more'!).

Minutes: The minutes of the last meeting, printed in the 1999 Newsletter, were taken as read but not signed.

Matters arising: Several letters were read out covering aspects dealt with in other parts of these minutes. Margaret Payne gave a résumé of the Motto discussions, following the item in the 1999 Newsletter. (see pages 13-14.*Ed*)

Chairman's Report: The Chairman gave her report. Exam results were excellent, various rooms in the main school were being refurbished, houses rewired and general security updated. Special courses for dyslexic and overseas students had been started, and desks phased out. John Rutter will be holding a workshop in the chapel; St George's returns to their own renovated church in November, after two years of sharing St Mark's. Mrs Meek thanks everyone for their support and loyalty.

Hon Treasurer's report: Frances Bearn (Moojen) presented the following report:

"This year's report is not dissimilar to last year's, in that the accounts are quite healthy. We managed to balance our budget quite well, and are in profit to the tune of £500. However, as the accounts show, we really do not make much profit. £1,300 was transferred to the Church Board of Finance Deposit Account, where we are achieving a slightly better rate of interest than that on offer from Barclays Bank. New subscriptions for the summer just gone number 36 (£1080). I understand that sixth form numbers are down this year, and that this may be the case for the next few years. However, on the balance side, we can thank Penny Gardiner for stirring up the 'undergrowth', and finding quite a few old girls who left before the automatic debiting system came into play. If this good work can be continued, with everyone's help we shall be able to maintain the status quo.

Last year's anticipated increase in postage costs did not materialise. At present the Newsletter package weighs approximately 77g, and the next second class postage rate of 40p kicks in at 100g. However, as our database is increasing, these costs will rise marginally.

Revenue from the raffle held at each reunion has continued to increase. My thanks go to Margaret Payne for being the main initiator and organiser of the raffles, and best wishes to Anne Stapleton and Diana Gosnell who will be running it at future events. My thanks go also to Chris Elkins for auditing the accounts."

Constitution: Amendments to the constitution were discussed and referred to the Committee to be presented to the next AGM.

[Editor's Note

It was felt that a number of changes were needed to bring the Constitution into line with current practice, and to reflect more accurately the current aims and policies of the Association. The 1951 Constitution is printed in full on pages 15 and 16. It stipulates that notice of any proposed change should be posted to members with the notice of the forthcoming AGM.

Notice of the AGM is included on page 11 of this newsletter, and therefore the following list of proposed changes (with new wording in bold italics) complies with this requirement.

Amendment to paragraph 1

add to the end '... to serve as a source of support, both spiritual and practical, to the Hall *and to former pupils and staff*.'

Amendment to paragraph 4

delete whole paragraph and replace with 'Each member shall pay a life subscription, the amount of which shall be determined from time to time by the Committee.'

Amendment to paragraph 7.4a

delete 'Hon Secretaries of Home Counties and Sussex Branches', and replace with 'Hon Secretary for Overseas Members'.

Amendment to paragraph 7.4c

delete 'four other elected members' and replace with 'six other elected members'.

Amendment to paragraph 7.5

add '... members to serve for a period of one year'.

Since the AGM, SMHA has received requests for membership from members of the wider SMH community, for example Governors and ex-parents, who would welcome the invitation to join SMHA. It is thus proposed that the Constitution be amended to provide for Associate Members along the following lines.

Paragraph 3

Add at the end 'In addition, present and former Governors, parents of former pupils, and others involved in SMH or SMHA but not eligible for full membership, shall be eligible for Associate Membership, at the discretion of the Committee'.

Paragraph 4

Add at the end 'The amount of subscription, if any, for Associate Members, shall be determined from time to time by the Committee'.]

Year 2000 celebrations: Penny Gardiner said that although the school calendar was full, suggestions had been made for celebrating the new century. These included fireworks, a concert, a ball, a barbecue, talks by Old Girls etc. In consultation with Mrs Meek, it was decided that SMHA should present the school with a flagpole. Laura Bristol spoke of her school's Gift Fund which enabled pupils to take part in field trips and outings. It was agreed that SMHA would set up a similar fund for current pupils. The meeting closed with a prayer.

Light Years

The thoughts of Sheila Allison (née Humphrys) on the school motto (following page) come from the SMH Millennium Anthology, *Light Years*, published in December 1999.

As the compiler, Liz Fincham, says in the preface to the book, 'It reflects very clearly the concerns of our school community, global and individual, universal and personal'. Current pupils write of school events, the plight of refugees, environmental issues, the eclipse, and everyday things they enjoy. BEFORE HONOR, HUMILITY

How do I feel about the school motto? To tell the truth I never took much notice of it at school, it was never a guiding light for me, but I did absorb its meaning in some fundamental way.

Humility may be seen by some as old-fashioned, unsuitable, and out of step with 1999.

However, if you translate from 1904 to 1999, the sentiment is still real, living, and should be one of the first concepts of any teaching environment.

Humility is not about being humble or bending a knee, it is about being modest and recognising your own faults, shortcomings and strengths in order to become a person able to accept Honours with honour and eventually to be able to return those gains to the community from which they sprang.

BEFORE HONOR HUMILITY

The use and suitability of the School Motto

Following comments made at the 1998 AGM, it was decided to have a discussion on the subject of the motto at the May 1999 Reunion. The meeting was chaired by Miss Payne, who prepared this report.

Mrs **Jean Roberts**, SMH's honorary archivist, noted that the earliest references she had found to a School Motto were in 1902 and 1903, and at that time the motto was rather more long-winded.

Aim high, and always try once oftener than you fail.

The origin of 'before honor is humility' is in two Biblical references in the book of Proverbs.

The fear of the Lord is the instruction of wisdom; before honour is humility. Proverbs, Chapter 15, verse 33.

Before destruction the heart of man is haughty and before honour is humility. Proverbs, Chapter 18, verse 12.

I must confess I thought Henry Venn Elliott a great student of the Bible and that our Founder must have suggested this motto, but this was obviously not the case, as the first reference Jean Roberts could find to it was in 1904. Despite the fact that it carried the note 'Our Founder's motto for the School', it must have been the proposal either of the Headmistress, Miss Potter, or perhaps of the Chairman of the Governors. No reference to this motto appears in Bateman's biography of H V Elliott.

Over the years, notably in the 1930s and in 1954, the motto has changed slightly, with variants of the spelling honor/honour, and the inclusion of the word 'is' before humility.

I know many Old Girls have expressed concern that this motto has been omitted from the new school logo. Many of those present at this discussion wanted *Before Honor Humility* included wherever possible. However, many of those currently involved with the school thought it was important to make the change to facilitate the increased marketing of the school abroad.

Mrs Meek explained fully that the motto had not been dropped completely, but that when used in small publicity material it had not reproduced successfully . She was very ready to listen to suggestions.

When views were asked for from Old Girls and former members of staff, there was a strong feeling that the Motto should be in a prominent place in the school, and that it should be explained fully, perhaps at Assembly.

Kim Cook (1954-60) has produced an excellent account in which she points out that:

. . . the concept of humility has nothing whatever to do either with Uriah Heep or with doormats. Rather, humility is about recognising that God is greater than we are, and acknowledging our debt to Him for all that we have and all that we are. Assertiveness and ambition are both fine in that context. In fact, it is quite clear that God wants each of His children to achieve his or her full potential, and to use wisely the gifts and talents He has given. So I see no difficulty in retaining the motto in the light of the school's aims to turn out young women who can have fulfilling roles both in the home and in their working lives. . . . What is important is that it has been a valuable guideline for staff and pupils for at least 95 years and, properly understood, still has relevance and validity today.

Other suggestions for use of the motto included incorporating it on the cover of the School Magazine, retaining it on the Association Newsletter, and perhaps including it on the badges presented to all the Sixth Form.

Alice Rawdon-Mogg, the present Head Girl, was also in favour of the motto being promoted in the school. She felt that the true concept of humility involves a combination of consideration for others, rectitude, and perseverance. However, there were those who felt that a lack of understanding of the true concept of humility was a distinct drawback. There was, too, and awareness that not all pupils come from Christian backgrounds, and that in some cultures humility has a negative image.

Unfortunately, time for discussion was very limited, but perhaps there can be a fuller discussion on another occasion.

After the meeting I found an interesting passage in Miss Meades' *History of SMH*, 1836-1956. This extract from an address made by Henry Venn Elliott on 1 August 1859 to the staff, pupils and friends suggests that our Founder would certainly have approved of the current motto.

Have true unity. Humility and love are necessary to produce it. Pray for me. St Paul asks the prayers of his youngest converts, and I will ask yours. Pray for your Superintendent; pray for the Governesses. Remember that without the blessing of God on their teaching, it is labour in vain; you learn everything in vain if God is not with you, to bless both those who teach and those who learn.

SMHA (1951) CONSTITUTION

New Constitution as proposed by the Constitution Sub Committee chaired by Mildred Riddlesdell, amended and approved at the Annual General Meeting held on Saturday April 14th 1951 at the YWCA, Great Russell Street, London WC1, chaired by Miss Conrady.

Objects

1. The objects of the Association shall be to link Old Pupils of the Hall together and to serve as a source of support, both spiritual and practical, to the Hall.

Patrons

 People who have given distinguished service to the Hall may be invited to become patrons of the Association.

Membership

 All Old Girls and all past teaching staff of the Hall shall be eligible for membership. Present teaching staff and members of the VI th form shall be invited to attend Annual General Meetings without becoming members of the Association, but shall not be entitled to vote.

Subscription

4. From 1st January 1952, each member shall pay an annual subscription of at least 5/- or a life membership subscription of at least £3 except that existing members at that date may have the option of continuing to pay an annual subscription of 4/-. The name of any member (not being a Life Member) who fails to pay her subscription for two consecutive years shall be removed from the membership list. After forty years continuous membership a member may apply for Hon Life Membership.

General Meetings

- 5. (1) There shall be an Annual General Meeting of the Association.
 - (2) The Chairman shall call such Extraordinary General Meetings as may be necessary. The Chairman must call an Extraordinary General Meeting if at least twenty members of the Association ask her in writing to do so.

Notices of Meetings

6. The date of the Annual General Meeting shall be fixed provisionally at the preceding Annual General Meeting and items for the Agenda shall be sent to the Secretary at least six weeks before the date so provisionally fixed. The Secretary shall send members firm notice of the time and place of the Annual General Meeting at least one month beforehand, and the agenda of the meeting shall be circulated with this notice. The Secretary shall send members notice of the time and place of an Extraordinary General Meeting as early as possible and at least a week before the date when it is to be held. Notice of the Agenda of an Extraordinary General Meeting shall be given with the notice of the meeting and no other business shall be transacted at such a meeting.

Note: Proposed amendments to the constitution are as noted in this Newsletter, on pages 9 and 10, publication of which is in accordance with Paragraph 9 above. The formal notice of the 2000 AGM is on page 11.

Management

- 7. (1) The Headmistress shall be the Chairman and President of the Association.
 - (2) An Old Girl may be elected to fill the office of Vice Chairman and Vice President of the Association.
 - (3) The other officers of the Association shall be:-
 - (a) An Honorary Secretary (elected)
 - (b) An Honorary Treasurer (elected)
 - (c) An Honorary Secretary of the Home Counties Branch (elected)
 - (d) An Honorary Secretary of the Sussex Branch (elected)
 - (e) An Honorary Editor of the News Letter (elected)
 - (f) Such Honorary Vice Presidents as the Association may appoint, including all ex Headmistresses.
 - (4) The Association shall be managed by a Committee which shall consist of:-
 - (a) The Chairman, Vice Chairman, Vice Presidents, Hon. Secretary, Hon. Treasurer, Hon. Editor of the News Letter, and the Hon. Secretaries of the Home Counties and Sussex Branches
 - (b) All Old Girls who are Governors of the School.
 - (c) Four other elected members.
 - (5) The committee may co-opt two other members.
 - (6) The Officers shall be elected for a period of office of three years and shall be eligible for re-election. Other elected Members of the Committee shall serve for a term of two (three from 5th May 1979) years. They may be elected for a second term, but after serving for two consecutive terms they shall be ineligible for membership of the Committee for two years.
 - (7) Elections of officers and Committee Members shall take place at the Annual General Meeting. Vacancies occurring between Annual General Meetings maybe filled temporarily by co-option, the vacancies being filled by election at the Annual General Meeting.
 - (8) The Committee shall meet at least once a year. The quorum shall be seven.
 - (9) The Committee may appoint sub-Committees. The Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary shall be ex-officio members of all sub-Committees. In the event of the Chairman not wishing to serve as Chairman of a sub-Committee the sub-Committee shall appoint its own Chairman.

Balance Sheet

8. The balance sheet shall be presented to the Annual General Meeting. The accounts shall be audited.

Amendments

9. Proposed amendments to the Constitution shall be submitted to a General Meeting of the Association and shall be adopted if two thirds of the members present vote for them. Notice of any proposed amendment shall be sent to members with the notice of the General Meeting (see paragraph 6)

NEWS

Please note that news has been divided into three sections - visits from overseas, news of pre-war pupils and staff, and news of those at SMH after 1945. In each section, news has been collated in alphabetical order of names by which the people concerned were known at school, with current surname in brackets. This has been done at the request of many readers, in order to make it easier to find information about old friends.

Visits from old girls living overseas continue to be a regular part of school life, and an excellent means of the Association catching up with 'lost' contacts. In December 1998 **Gillian Kingham** (Mrs Lewis) and her daughter Jennie called in at SMH while on a visit from their home in Wellington, New Zealand. Gillian (1953-59) and Jennie also visited **Margaret Payne**, and Margaret recalls that 'Jennie was very amused at some of our recollections!'. Gillian has now joined SMHA.

When **Shirley Read-Jahn** (1950s) called in during the late summer, she was on a trip from her home in San Francisco, where she is an ex-officio director of the San Francisco Jazz Festival. Shirley extended an invitation for musicians from SMH to visit the festival this year. Shirley will be returning to the UK for the Grand Reunion in May, meeting up with her sister **Pam** (Mrs Bailey) who is travelling from Sydney, Australia.

Barbara (Babs) Stewart (Ms Woolf) visited SMH in June while meeting up with cousins in the UK, but sadly, shortly after Barbara returned to Australia, her mother died. While in Brighton, Barbara (1950s) had greatly enjoyed being given a tour of the school, which 'brought back so many happy memories' of her time at SMH, initially in Elliott House, and later in Babington.

In addition to those who were unable to attend the AGM and sent apologies for absence (qv), many more have sent in news.

Memories of SMH in pre-war years are recalled by a number of old girls.

Eleanor Birks (Mrs Gaunt), at SMH 1926-31, writes: 'I belong to the generation which wore liberty bodices, thick black and brown stockings, gym tunics with overalls on top, embroidered on the shoulders by an assistant matron (poor soul), and other horrors, but it didn't stop us enjoying life.' Eleanor is still in contact with **Joan Eastham** and **Hildegard Francis**.

Margaret Broughton-Thompson (Mrs Mortimer) joined SMH in 1937 and left when the school closed down in 1940. She recalls how one of her sisters took part in the great Centenary Pageant in 1936, and worked a cross-stitch stool seat in blue and gold, with the monogram of SMH in the centre, and the legend '1836-1936 - Before Honour is Humility' around the edge. (*Does anyone know what became of the stool? - Ed*). **Sheila Humphrys** (Mrs Allison), (qv) a contemporary of Margaret's, was at the September 1999 reunion.

Mary Chalmers (Mrs Scully) was delighted to be at the Spring 1999 reunion - her first since 1984 - but was unable to come to the September one, as she was waiting to have an eye operation. Mary (1933-39) was saddened to learn of the death in June of **Pat McCormack**, Art Mistress at SMH from 1938-40, at the age of 81 (see Obituaries). Mary's daughter **Rosemary Scully** (Mrs Heald) (qv) is also a member of SMHA.

Moyra Corscaden was able to attend both the spring and autumn reunions in 1999, and at the September reunion was nearest in guessing the number of returned forms. Her prize was a bottle of wine, donated by **Pam Cryer** of Leeford Vineyard.

Dorothy Emmet (1918-1923) dictated a lively and fascinating letter from The Hope Residential Care Home in Cambridge. Obviously still in fine fettle, Dorothy has just brought out what she says will be her last book, *Outward Forms, Inner Springs*, published by Macmillan. Dorothy recalls that in an earlier book, *Philosophers and Friends* (Macmillan 1996) she included a brief account of Miss Ghey and her engaging gift of writing light verse. Dorothy adds: 'For a number of years we had an annual event of doings in an imaginary village, Muddle on the Marsh, in which Miss Ghey was Lady of the Manor, Lady FitzPelham de Montague, and I was the village schoolmistress. [In the play] the vicar always had to be called away on urgent business elsewhere, as it was not thought proper that one of us should portray him on the stage.'

Hester Girdlestone (Mrs Oliver) is the middle, and only surviving, Girdlestone sister, and was at SMH from 1918 to 1927. Hester writes, in a very clear hand, of her sisters and their achievements. Charity (Mrs Robins), who gained a degree in History, was for a time school secretary at SMH. After her marriage to a clergyman, Charity lived first in Keighley and then in Devon, and is survived by two daughters. Angela, the youngest of the three sisters, won a gold medal as Nurse of the Year at the General Hospital, Birmingham, where she trained. Hester herself gained diplomas in Music and Theology, and taught in schools in the dioceses of Chester and Birmingham. She has a daughter, now in Canada, and three surviving sons, one of whom is Headmaster of a comprehensive school in Leighton Buzzard, and one is the well-known composer Stephen Oliver.

Although **Joyce Gosney**, now 82, retired from teaching in 1977, she continued with private coaching for many years. Since then she has been busy with various committees, meals on wheels, and church work, as well as being a keen bowls player. Joyce (1929-35) is still in touch with **Barbara Taylor** (Mrs Barton) and her sister **Gay Taylor** (Mrs Barton). Barbara, who 'must be about 84', was still farming in Nayland, Essex last year! Gay, who lives in the wilds of Scotland, near Ullapool, was widowed some years ago, but now has a daughter living nearby, and between them they run a small-holding with a few animals. Gay has a son who works in the Antarctic from time to time. (*The Taylors are obviously a very hardy bunch! - Ed*)

Congratulations to **Aletha Gunnery** (Sister Ruth, CSD) who reached the grand age of 100 on 25 November 1999! After leaving SMH in 1918, Aletha went to Chelsea College of Physical Education and later taught at a school in Lincoln. In 1927 she went to St Denys, Warminster, Missionary Training College, and after two years joined the Anglican community at St Denys convent 'to test her vocation'. In 1932, Aletha was professed as Sister Ruth. Six years later, the Community of St Denys sent Sister Ruth to India, where she taught at their school for Anglo-Indian girls at Nankom in Chota Nagpur, and was in charge of a hostel for small boys. During the war, under the threat of Japanese invasion, the school was evacuated to Allahabad, and while there Sister Ruth was appointed Sister-in-

Charge. Later, the school passed into lay hands, and Sister Ruth worked at village centres in Itki and Manoharpur, before returning to England in 1947. Two years later she was sent out to Transkei to take charge of a new community house there. In 1957, Sister Ruth was elected Mother Superior, a post she held for twelve years. After her retirement, Sister Ruth continued to help wherever she was needed, both at the community house in Chiswick, London, and in the convent at Warminster. She is now at Sarum College, Salisbury. Although Sister Ruth can no longer read much, Sister Frances Anne reads the magazine to her, and tells us that Sister Ruth is still very interested in her old school.

Sheila Humphrys (Mrs Allison) was delighted to be at the 1999 AGM and reunion, with her daughter **Penny Buck** (Mrs Gardiner), (qv) who is now a Governor of the School. Sheila's contribution to the motto debate is printed on page 12.

Barbara Hunt (Mrs Millbourn) appreciated the warm reminder for the September reunion, and was very sorry that she could not attend. However, Barbara (1930-36) plans to be at the Grand Reunion in May, adding that it is 'an excellent way to celebrate the Millennium for us all'. In anticipation of the great welcome awaiting everyone, Barbara hopes to persuade a contemporary old girl to come with her. (Who will it be? We look forward to finding out in May! - Ed)

Margaret Jones (Mrs McCall) had many pleasant surprises at the May 1999 Reunion Lunch, where she met many people she hadn't seen since her last visit to SMH in the 1960s. Margaret (1932-40) spent Christmas in Euschede, Holland, with three generations of her family. The only one missing was her elder son, John, still working with Christian Aid in the Congo. However, during a week of 'rest and recreation', John was able to travel to Sringa, Tanzania, to visit another SMH old girl, Elizabeth Kennedy (Mrs Phillips).

Margaret Lloyd (1921-30) is now 87, and has also lost touch with most of her contemporaries. After many years of working for CMS in their headquarters, Margaret now lives in a CMS residential home in Tunbridge Wells, (appropriately called Venn House!). Despite her years, Margaret remains fairly active and mobile, and regularly plays the piano at evening devotions in Venn House.

Sonia (Sunny) Mackay (Mrs Warner) made her first visit back to SMH for many years when she attended the reunion in September, and thoroughly enjoyed it. Sonia left SMH in 1940.

K H Marshall (Mrs Lacey) (1934-39) was unfortunately away in September, and was unable to come to the AGM.

Mary Reeson (Mrs Clements) (1932-40) thinks the idea of a lunch-time reunion is an excellent one, and in 1999 brought three of her contemporaries to the spring reunion - Angela Wright (Mrs Waller), Jean Barker (Mrs McEwan) and Alyson Nunn (Mrs Knight).

Elizabeth Ryan (Mrs Herdon), who was at SMH from 1928-32, is now 86 and finds travelling difficult, but does occasionally manage to see her sister **Patricia Ryan** (Mrs Storey) who lives in Topsham, Devon. Elizabeth wrote that she hoped 'one day to visit the Hall and bring my great grand-daughter (aged 4) - wish I could win a lottery and send her to the Hall!'. That hoped-for visit became a reality in

December when Elizabeth was on a visit to Sussex and spent some time at SMH. Elizabeth is still in touch with **Elizabeth Moore**, **Katherine Seth** (Mrs Ross-Thomson) and **Diana Harris** (Mrs Bruton).

Although unable to attend the September AGM and reunion, Alma Smallpiece (Mrs Fosbery) was delighted to receive the prize as the winner of the draw for returned forms. Alma (1922-25) is now in a Warminster nursing home which has a large staff, so her box of biscuits was generously shared round. Before moving into the nursing home, Alma met Clare Sangster (Mrs Milsted), another old girl of SMH, whose father was Canon Sangster. Although unable to get around much, Alma is still constantly reminded of SMH. Her contemporaries included Margaret Lloyd and Eileen Vaughan (Mrs Reekie). Alma is still in touch with Margaret, and with Jean Reekie (Mrs Payne), who was at SMH from 1950-56. In another coincidental meeting, Alma spoke to a visitor to the home who had come from Brighton, and was amazed to find that the visitor not only knew SMH, but had had six cousins who were pupils! (Please, can anyone identify who this might be, and who the six cousins are? - Ed)

Juliet Stebbing (Mrs Littlewood) also has memories of this era, although she has lost touch with her contemporaries. Juliet (1924-31) was the third member of her family to attend SMH, and remembers her oldest sister, **Margaret Joy Stebbing** (now deceased), as being the best scholar. 'I was only good at hockey', Juliet recalls, and despite achieving five credits in GSC, didn't gain her matriculation as she failed to pass in Latin 'in spite of special tuition with Miss Ghey'. Juliet visited SMH in August, and records that her two daughters and grand-daughter, who accompanied her on the visit, were much impressed with the school buildings. Juliet and her husband live in Bradford on Avon.

'Advancing age and infirmity' prevented **Jean Stuart** (Mrs Baxter) from making the 180-mile round trip from Thatcham to Brighton for either of the 1999 reunions, but she sent news of her two daughters **Alice Baxter** and **Kate** (qv), both also old girls. Jean (1928-1936) very much enjoyed the last newsletter, with 'lots of news of my contemporaries'.

Moving on to pupils from more recent times,

Amoret Abis (1989-98) was among those who attended the reunion supper in September.

Libby Ager (Mrs Thompson) is separating from her husband. She has been very well supported by her friends, particularly those from SMH, and has recently bought herself a house in Brighton.

Veronica Alsop (Mrs Smith) and her sister **Jane** (Mrs Wharton) were both at the September 1999 reunion. In July this year Veronica (1953-62) is hoping to take early retirement from teaching and move to Northampton, where she and her husband have a share in a canal boat. Their two daughters are also teachers 'despite both their parents being in the profession!'. Jane (1955-62) keeps in contact with **Rosemary Boorne** (Mrs Gillies), who was the exchange student with SMH New Jersey in 1965. Rosemary (1959-66), who hopes to be at the Grand Reunion in

May, wonders what happened to the other New Jersey exchange students, including **Sheelagh Dodds**, and whether they will be able to come to the reunion. (*The first SMH New Jersey exchange student was Tricia Dahl in 1958. Can anyone help find Tricia, Sheila, or any of the other exchange students? - Ed*)

Julia Bagshaw (Mrs Dunnicliffe) lives with her husband Charles and nine-year-old daughter Anne near Diss, on the Norfolk/Suffolk border 'in the middle of nowhere, with a labrador dog, pony, a few chickens and half of the country's wild rabbits!' Having trained in business studies, nursing, and yoga teaching, Julia has just completed a teaching diploma.

Liz Baker (Mrs Caudle) and three friends had a mini-reunion in London in May. Liz (1950-64) travelled from Cheltenham, Sherry Coe (Mrs Carter) from Ditchling, Jane Harvey (Mrs Porter) all the way from Queensland, Australia, and Jenny Riley (Mrs Wray) from Purley, Surrey. Jenny (1951-63) has her own executive recruitment business, set up in 1991, recruiting mainly management consultants and IT professionals. She is active in the Liberal Democrat party, and was their candidate for Wantage in the 1997 general election. Jenny is also in touch with Vicky Burge (Mrs Schofield).

Penny Barnes (1957-61) was disappointed not to be able to get to the September reunion as her job 'is so unsociable, especially at the weekends', but sent her best wishes for a very successful day.

Anne Barr (Mrs Carr-Hill) has returned to work with the Lawn Tennis Association. Her son Oliver is thriving, and they stayed with Susan Roller (qv) on their way up to Scotland last July.

SMHemC was formed in September 1999 and is hosted on the World Wide Web at <<www.onelist.com>>. The purpose is to provide a quick, easy and inexpensive way of communicating with all members of the SMH community, not just OGs, but Governors, Staff (current and ex), pupils, parents and other interested parties from the local area. It is an unfortunate fact of the www that a predominantly female presence may attract unwelcome attention. To prevent this, the SMHemC is both a restricted and a moderated e-mail community. This makes it harder for you to join up, but also makes it more secure when you do join.

'Restricted' means requests for membership can be screened to make sure that each request is from a genuine member of the SMH community. 'Moderated' means all messages posted on to SMHemC are screened for content before going out to all members. Already the membership encompasses Governors, an ex-Headmistress, current staff, and old girls of all ages across the world. The oldest of these is 76, so there is no excuse for you younger ones to say you are too old for all this modern stuff! Best of all, membership of SMHemC is FREE! No cost, no obligation. If you don't like it, just leave the community - it's as simple as that. SMHemC will do the rest.

OBITUARIES

SUSAN (Suzi) JENNIFER BANNISTER (Mrs Veazev)

Suzi died in California on the first day of Spring - 21 March 1999 - after a three-and-a-half year battle with cancer. Suzi initially had surgery for bowel cancer in the autumn of 1995. She fought the illness she faced with courage in her typically brave and optimistic way.

She flew all over the world to many faraway places where, in those days, there was plenty of time off! It was during her flying days that she met her husband Wesley, an American. Suzi and Wes married in January 1976 at Preston Old Church, in Preston Park (my daughter was her bridesmaid) and they moved to Dallas/Fort Worth. Subsequently they moved to Lafayette, Louisiana (where her mother still lives), to Dothan and then Enterprise, Alabama, to San Diego, California, and finally to Westlake Village, between Los Angeles and Santa Barbara.

Their son Jonathan, who was born in 1978, attended Westlake High School, where Suzi was a tireless worker for the School Scholarship Foundation and the PTA. As a result of her work, she was awarded an 'Honorary Service Award' by the school and, shortly before her death, a newly-established scholarship was set up in her name. Many tributes came from friends and others who knew her in this work. On a personal note, Suzi was a life-long friend, only from school days, but also from pony riding in Saltdean, a flatmate in London, my bridesmaid, and Godmother to my daughter. After her parents moved from Hove to Lafayette in the early 80s to be closer to Suzi and her family, Suzi would stay with us whenever she came to the UK. I travelled to the US on quite a number of occasions to see her. My last visit was in August 1998.

I, like many others, miss her wit, her happy disposition, and above all her friendship, which she maintained, despite the distance, through frequent and usually lengthy telephone calls. She was an example to us all.

Suzi is survived by her husband, son, and her mother.

Mary Cunliffe (Mrs Cole - SMH 1950-59)

NORA MAY BURDEN (Mrs Callow)

Nora was born in 1914 in Mengo Hospital, Kampala, the daughter of CMS missionaries. For most of her schooldays she was a boarder at SMH, where she was a contemporary of my mother Mary Wade (Mrs Bell).

After leaving school, Nora trained as an SRN at St Bartholomew's. She then married and had two children, but sadly, she lost her first husband when the children were very young. After his death she ran a nursing home in Devon for some years, and later met and married a Devon farmer, Ronald Callow. They were married for 25 years until his death.

Nora then moved to Radstock, where she soon settled in to the local church and community. I first met her in 1967, and after the death of my mother in 1973, Nora became like a second mother to me.

Her final illness meant that Nora had to give up her home, but her strong Christian faith continued to sustain her throughout her last illness. When I visited her, I was struck by her peace and serenity.

Nora will be sadly missed, but she knew she was going to be 'with Christ, which is far better'. She leaves a son and daughter, four grandchildren and one great-grandchild, as well as two brothers.

PAT McCORMACK

Pat McCormack taught art at SMH from 1938-40. In the Association's survey form she returned in 1986, she gave her career details as follows:

'Art Teacher at St Mary's Hall, Wrekin College, The Grove School Hindhead, Huyton College and Badminton School. Tutor at Bath Academy of Art, Corsham, and now, with friend and partner, running Abson Books - publishing.'

Asked for other information about work, achievement, etc, Pat wrote:

'Bits and bobs - not worth talking about! Enclosed is our Book List if it's of any interest. We only publish original paperbacks. We ourselves printed our first three books but as they were best sellers we had to put the printing out! We do not [doubly underlined!] publish fiction.'

Pat came to SMH as Art Mistress in 1938 - her first teaching post. She was a breath of fresh air, an excellent teacher, coping with much out-of-date equipment. My happiest hours were spent in the studio. Then came the war and we all scattered, but we kept in touch.

Years later we lived in Bristol and my husband, an architect, helped Pat and Anthea buy two tumble-down cottages, which developed into a lovely studio and home, and the birthplace of the Abson Press.

To comply with a request made by Pat some years earlier, the poem 'I am not there', was read at her funeral. Somehow it epitomises just how she felt.

Mary Chalmers (Mrs Scully)

VIRGINIA (Ginnie) REID

Ginnie came to SMH as a boarder in 1957 when her parents were posted to Washington DC, and stayed until she had completed her GCEs in 1959. After leaving SMH, she went to secretarial college in London, and subsequently worked in advertising and the film industry. In January 1966 Ginnie married William Hoare, an officer in the Royal Air Force.

William's service in the RAF took them to many postings in the UK, as well as to Canada. Their elder son James was born in 1968, and Jonathan two years later. The family settled in Scotland in the early 1980s, and both boys were educated there. Ginnie was a keen gardener and particularly cultivated a wide variety of heathers. Sadly, she developed cancer, and died in June 1998, soon after the birth of her first grand-daughter.

Despite the distances involved, we kept in touch, and managed visits whenever I was in the UK. Ginnie was a good friend for over forty years, and I feel her loss tremendously.

Anne Bearne (Mrs Bell - SMH 1955-59)

BRIGADIER DAME JEAN RIVETT-DRAKE, DBE

Jean Elizabeth Rivett-Drake, who was born on 13 July 1909, spent her early years in Sussex, and was educated at SMH. Known as Betty by her friends (including those from SMH), during her army career she acquired the affectionate nickname Puddleduck - a parody of her surname rather than a comment on her character!

Betty began her military career in the 1930s in the First Aid Nursing Yeomanry. This was the nursing division of the Territorial Army, at that time the only military career open to a women. She became a military driver and in 1940 transferred to the Auxiliary Territorial Service (ATS).

During the war years transport was vital. Despite the often haphazard nature of vehicles available, Betty's leadership and organisational skills solved many problems, and these qualities were quickly noticed. In 1942 she was commissioned, and by 1944, having been promoted to Captain, she was involved in the D-day landings.

Her company was the first ATS unit to land in France, where they worked tirelessly round the clock, delivering ammunition, fuel and all kinds of supplies. Despite the pressures, 'Puddleduck' was renowned for showing great care for the drivers under her command. She was mentioned in despatches, and in 1945 was promoted to second-in-command of the ATS North-West Europe Group. For her services with this group she was appointed MBE in 1947.

With post-war changes in attitudes to women officers, Betty was accepted for a regular commission. In 1949 she became Acting Lieutenant-Colonel, and in 1954 was posted to Singapore as Assistant Director, Far East Land Forces. At a time when there was fighting in Malaya and much unrest in the region, she commanded almost 1000 women soldiers who fulfilled key tasks supporting the British military presence in the Far East.

1961 saw Betty back in England, where she was promoted to Brigadier, appointed Director, WRAC, and honorary ADC to the Queen. She fought to widen the range of trades and specialities open to women soldiers, reorganised WRAC deployment world-wide, oversaw the establishment of new WRAC barracks at Guildford, and established a WRAC museum.

In May 1962 Betty returned to SMH as the Speech Day guest of honour. Miss Conrady spoke of her as 'an Old Girl of the Hall, of whose honours and achievements we can feel justly proud'. Betty in turn recalled that in her career she had learned 'to see so clearly what School and training does for each one of us'. She stressed the importance of standards, imposed in school days, but maintained by determination and self-discipline in later life. In addition, she noted that a readiness to serve others encouraged selflessness, and brought its own rewards. But she emphasised too, the need for humour, enjoyment and enthusiasm, advising that humour could smooth over many difficulties.

In 1964, the year of her retirement, Betty was appointed DBE and returned to her home county of Sussex. Retirement is perhaps not the appropriate term, for she was active in many areas of local life. In 1966 she joined Hove Council, and served as a Councillor for 18 years, becoming Chairman of the Education Committee, and serving on Policy and Housing Committees. In 1977 she became the first woman to be elected Mayor of Hove. She also became a JP, and later Chairman of the Bench. In this capacity she was part of a team which visited Canada, in response to a request from the Canadian government, to advise on the introduction of a similar justice system there.

From 1973-78 Betty was a lay member of the Press Council, and in 1983 was appointed a Deputy Lieutenant for East Sussex. A keen supporter of Brighton Youth Orchestra, she became its President, and was also Divisional President of the Brighton and Hove Guides Association.

Tall and distinguished, a quick thinker, straight talker and excellent organiser, Betty was also legendary for the care she showed for those around her - the women who served under her command, and the local people with whom she worked. After her death, aged 90, in August 1999, many of those people - politicians, magistrates, Army personnel, local dignitaries and friends, joined in a memorial service at All Saints' Church, Hove.

ELIZABETH ENID STOREY (Mrs Clark)

Elizabeth Enid Storey (later Mrs Clark), who died last autumn aged 93, taught English at St Mary's Hall in the 1930s. Later she taught at Roedean, and subsequently in London, where her pupils included Vanessa Redgrave. In recent years she had been living in the same nursing home in Warminster as Alma Smallpiece (Mrs Fosbery), and they had shared their memories of SMH.

PATRICIA WOOD (Mrs Vedast)

Don Campion, a long-standing friend of Patricia, sent this tribute to her.

Patricia Wood was born in Cookham Dean, near Henley-on-Thames on St Patrick's day 1907, and was educated at St Mary's Hall. After leaving school in 1924, Patricia worked on a farm and as a nanny to raise the £10 needed to fund her training as a nurse. She entered nursing in the early 1930s at what was then the

London Hospital, now the Royal London (a change of name she didn't like and would never use!). In 1940, when the London Hospital was bombed, Patricia moved to the West Middlesex Hospital, only to be bombed out again. A move to the North Middlesex Hospital followed, but she was again bombed out, forcing another move, this time to Grovelands Hospital. After the war, Patricia returned to the North Middlesex Hospital, and worked there as a Ward Sister until her retirement in the 1960s.

During the war she had married the Hospital Engineer, and they survived together to celebrate their Golden Wedding in 1994. A few months later her husband died. They had no children.

Patricia often remarked 'Whatever did I need such a good education for? I'll never know.' But her good education stood her in good stead throughout her life.

With a little watching over from her friends, she survived alone in her own home in Edmonton, north London, still fending for herself, until her death at the age of 92.
