THE CAROL SERVICE AT ST. MARYS, KEMPTOWN



I had forgotten the tradition we had of swapping scarf tassels with other school scarves — I noticed mine had a few on it as well as my old embroidered name tag.

Sian Spencer read one of the readings, and there were the very familiar carols. One, in particular, reminded me of **Miss Ratner**, enthusiastically conducting the choir and waving her arms around during the choir's input into the last verse of 'O Come All Thee Faithful', and the temptation to sing it instead of sticking to the main tune!

After the service, I enjoyed sharing memories with **Jo Vicat**, who was at school at a similar time to me. We talked about **Mrs Webb** and her French lessons, **Mrs Alan** and how many girls were fearful of her and that she played the viola, **Miss Bristol** and how she has been part of (dedicated to) the school for decades, and **Mrs Martin's** English lessons when many of us tended to misbehave!

I have received these lovely stories for the newsletter from **Sue Carnochan**, who was previously the archivist for the school:

IN REMEMBRANCE

Heather Ford

Margaret Ellis 1967-1975 and I have been clearing out the last Archives from St. Mark's church and came across a framed embroidery given to S.M.H. in memory of Heather Ford, Head of P.E., who died in 1994. It was a great shock to all at the school and her family. There was a memorial service in St Mary's church, to which the whole school went. A kind parent made a beautiful embroidery dedicated to Heather and it hung in the Drawing Room until the school closed. I was able to contact Heather's brother and arranged for his son to collect it from me. So, the family now have it in their safe keeping and will treasure it. The Bird Table which the school purchased with donations given in memory of Heather, is still on the top terrace at S.M.H. There was also a Trust Fund set up to give Bursaries to pupils with sporting promise and several girls benefited.

Leila Yateem

We also found two water colours painted by Charles Harrington, which had been dedicated to the memory of **Leila Yateem**, a pupil who tragically died when a Comet Airliner crashed into the sea near Elba off the Italian coast on 10 January 1954. **Leila** was travelling back to S.M.H., after the Christmas holiday, spent in Singapore.

She was a pupil from 1950-1953. Two of her American friends decided to purchase these paintings and dedicate them to her memory. They also hung in the Drawing Room for many years. I did some research and found a family address, in the Kingdom of Bahrain, and on the off chance that it was still valid after 60 years, I sent a letter asking if they would like these paintings. Amazingly, I had a reply! I am now arranging to send them to the family unframed, and hopefully they too will be treasured once again.













I am so pleased that these memorials will no longer sit forlornly in a dusty cupboard but be lovingly appreciated by their families.

Hope it is of interest. I am still in touch with Anna, Roz and Tina - all four of us have been married now for nearly 50 years - my anniversary in March. Amazing to think about. We must have learnt something about team spirit from school to have made that record!

MURDER MOST FOUL

It has come to our attention that our archives include: Letters (2) and petition concerning the demolition of the shed which was the site of the murder of Edith Jeal (aged 5) Letter from Thomas Griffiths, builder and contractor, 106 St George's Road, Brighton, to H Hebbert [School Treasurer], enclosing a letter from Robert Burmann, Arlington House, Eastern Road, Brighton, 17 Dec 1891, and a petition to the Trustees of St Mary's Hall from local residents requesting the demolition of the shed or barn which was the site of the murder; copy of reply from HH, 22 Dec 1891. Edith was murdered on 10 December 1891, and her body was found in a shed in a field between Eastern Road and Chesham Road, which was rented from St Mary's Hall by RB as a playground for Arlington House School [see SMH 1/12/3]. This was actually, what was the lacrosse pitch on the south side of Eastern Road) so from that we've researched and found Criminal Records, Newspaper articles from across the country and an in-depth Chapter written by Douglas D' Enno in his book 'Foul deeds and suspicious deaths around Brighton'. Douglas' mother and grandmother were at SMH so he has been extremely generous in permitting the extracts to be reproduced by us. A prolific writer, Douglas also referred to the murder in a different book, 'Brighton Crime & Vice 1800-2000', which is replicated below, but if you wish to see the full chapter (with sketches and photographs) from 'Foul Deeds...' you are going to have to go to the website to read it!

WOOD, GEORGE

On the afternoon of Friday, 11 December 1891, the mutilated body of 5-year-old Edith Jeal from Bedford Buildings was found by a Corporation workman. It lay in a large shed in a playing field bounded to the north by Eastern Road, Kemp Town and to the south by Chesham Road. She had been strangled and sexually assaulted, her private parts being severely lacerated.

The previous evening, Edith had been sent on some errands, in company with her 9-year-old brother, Bertram. When he went into Trengrove's, at the corner of Manchester Row, off Upper Bedford Street, he left his sister standing outside. It was there that she met the stranger who violently murdered her. Bertram, on emerging from the shop, thought she might have run home. Neighbours whom the little girl might have gone to were visited and Edith's father went out searching for her all night, to no avail.

The perpetrator was, however, quickly traced. George Henry Wood, 29, a delivery man at Brighton Station, lived a couple of hundred yards away from the crime scene, at 11 Rock Street. On the night of the murder, he had left his work at the station at about 6 pm and, still in railway uniform, had gone out drinking locally. The police were able to trace his movements without difficulty. After visiting a number of pubs in Trafalgar Street, he was seen around 45 minutes later in Sydney Street carrying a small child in

his arms. When he fell over in the roadway, she ran off. Several people noticed him staggering about on his route eastwards to Edward Street, where he found another tavern. At about 8 pm, he was met in Lavender Street by a policeman who had known him for 10 years. PC Tuppen advised him to go home but he went off unsteadily round the corner.

Wood actually fell up against one witness, Rose Leggatt, at the corner of Montague Street and Upper Bedford Street. She saw him putting his hand towards a little child outside Trengrove's and saw her follow him to the middle of Somerset Street. There he was sighted by Mrs Alice Guy, who saw him pass her house at 8.20. She was standing by her front door and watched him walking unsteadily carrying a little girl, who was crying. She called out: 'Don't hurt that poor little thing.' The man turned round under the lamplight and she saw his face distinctly. She was sure it was Wood. Harry Spicer, a printer, saw a man carrying a child pass him in Eastern Road at about ten to nine. His face was hidden in the child's clothes.

Blood was found on the murderer's clothes when he was arrested on the afternoon the body was found. He had, in addition, apparently talked about the murder before it had been announced. His response throughout subsequent proceedings, and in personal letters, was that he had been drunk and could not now believe he had committed such a terrible act, of which he had no recollection.

Wood (who had, incidentally, been engaged to be married) was brought to trial for Edith's murder at Lewes on 6 April 1892 before Mr Justice Mathew. Defending counsel, Mr CF Gill – a noted Sussex barrister who was MARSHALL HALL's senior partner – told the jury that the prisoner had been suffering from epileptic insanity. The crime was so horrible that it must have been performed by an insane man. He said Wood was a confirmed epileptic and when drunk had no idea what he was doing. Dr CE Saunders, Medical Superintendent of the Sussex County Lunatic Asylum, said he had made a special study of insanity and epilepsy. He had examined the prisoner twice and he seemed perfectly rational. There were no indications of epileptic mania. Dr Sheppard, another specialist, gave evidence that he had found Wood depressed but quite collected. He was not insane by any means.

The judge had no time for the epilepsy/insanity speculations. If Wood had no recollection of what had happened on the fateful evening, why had he claimed that he had been at the circus? Was he unconscious when carrying the child through the street? The jury, too, were quite clear in their view. After only eight minutes, they returned a verdict that Wood was guilty of wilful murder and sentence of death was duly passed.


The Home Secretary rejected a petition started in Brighton for Wood to be sent to a criminal lunatic asylum. He saw no reason to interfere with the law and child-killer George Henry Wood was executed at Lewes Prison on 26 April 1892.

EXTRACT FROM THE FACEBOOK VIRTUAL COMMON ROOM (VCR)

Penny Barnes (Hunt) 1957-1961 has recently been sharing pages of her autograph book on the Facebook Virtual Common Room, which led to a flurry of other autographs making an appearance. Most autograph books have a witty ditty and the signature, and mine is no exception. **Penny's** autograph book is filled with lovely drawings from her friends at school – here are a few examples –



but the one that caused **Penny Harrison** and **Lis Eastham (Ferguson) 1969-1976** to investigate further was this one from Jennifer Pigg (Piggy) quoting from another old girl or member of staff: V H Friedlaender SMH 1889-1896:



This is the story of **Violet Friedlaender**:

Violet Helen Friedlaender wrote under her initials as **V H Friedlaender**; the surname was sometimes anglicised as Friedlander. She joined the Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU) in 1908, and became honorary secretary of the Forest Gate branch during the summer of 1909. She was born 'in the East', probably Palestine, as it was from Palestine that

she travelled as a child to foggy London, where she was sent to St Mary's Hall (age 10). Her book Pied Piper's Street records memories of going home for school holidays in horse-buses coloured 'blue, green, red, yellow, white and chocolate-coloured', but lacking a display of numbers or destinations; how the colour-blind ever got home is a mystery. **Friedlaender's** father seems to have died while she was still young, but her mother and brother shared her enthusiasm for women's suffrage.

By 1909 the women's movement had split, and although the WSPU was still dominant, the women of East London, who had been so prominent in it in the early days, were largely sidelined, and the Canning Town branch was in disarray, if not totally disbanded. When a serious attempt to revive the fortunes of the movement in West Ham was made, it happened in the more prosperous side of the borough, in Forest Gate. There had been open-air meetings in the north of the borough before **V H Friedlaender** set about reinvigorating the WSPU there.

That same year in summer she and her mother organised a WSPU camp on the coast, and the following year **VHF** was busy organising WSPU publicity during the two General Elections that occurred in January and December 1910. The WSPU grew increasingly militant nationally in its tactics, and in 1912 she took part in a window smashing campaign, and was sentenced to four months' in jail.

Somewhere about this time, West Ham WSPU made a banner, in silk and velvet, inscribed with the words 'Courage, Constancy, Success' beneath 'West Ham' and a logo – a medallion adapted from Sylvia Pankhurst's 'angel of freedom'. The lettering was produced by **V H Friedlaender** and her brother. (The flag is now held by the Museum of London. and an image can be viewed on their website. Search the catalogue under the appropriate years to find it.)

In March 1909 the weekly paper Votes for Women published the words of a song VHF had written to the tune of 'Marching to Georgia'. It goes with an appropriate swing:

Hurrah! Hurrah! We battle for the right, Hurrah! Hurrah! For peace with honour fight; Prisoners of war, we greet you! Victory is in sight; March with the Women's Army.

The Woman's Press, the publishing arm of the WSPU, also produced two calendars for the year 1910. The cheaper one cost a shilling, and was said to include 'mottoes'. the number and authorship of which were not noted in advertisements. The dearer calendar, costing 1/6d, was designed by Sylvia Pankhurst, and a motto was provided for each day by V H Friedlaender. Since both Sylvia Pankhurst and V H Friedlaender were writers, it seems very likely that they belonged to the Women Writers' Suffrage League, which was very active about this time; in 1909 the League was cooperating with the Actresses' Franchise League to put on shows starring Ellen Terry at the Scala Theatre. Friedlaender's novels show she was very conscious of her position in society as a woman and an artist. Her first published novel came out in 1922. In Mainspring: the Growth of a Soul, a man says to the leading female character: 'And in all these years I've never met the woman – the woman artist – who was willing to burn her boats; who, when it came to the point, really had the nerve to do it, and to know she had done the right thing, as I see you know it'.

Friedlaender published poems for many years, and a collection was brought out in 1931, called Mirrors and Angles (often miscalled Mirrors and Angels). Most of the verse had previously appeared in Country Life, but poems were also culled from a wide variety of

other journals and newspapers, from the Spectator and the Nation to the Manchester Guardian and the Queen.

Her time in West Ham cannot have been entirely to her liking. In the poem 'Solace' she asks:

How do the city folk, when their hearts are aching, Keep them from breaking?

This sounds as if it was written for Country Life, but sometimes she is sharper, and some of the satire is not irrelevant today. 'Ripe for Development', for instance:

Green is the pleasant glade Where birds and children go. In the oak's broad pool of shade Five sun-flecked horses show But soon, where the tree is laid, Shall squat a bungalow.

V H Friedlaender's stay in West Ham was brief, but it was a time of intense excitement and activity. After living in various parts of the country, in 1950 she died at Buckhurst Hill, on the Essex fringe of East London. Her collection Mirrors and Angles had come out only a few years after women had finally achieved equality in the franchise. Suffragettes such as **Friedlaender** knew that in time the rights they had fought for would be taken for granted. One of the poems reprinted n the book could have served as her epitaph:

Swan-Song of any Pioneers

They reap with singing where through bitter days we sowed the seed;

They eat the bread for which our dearest perished their need;

They say, "Behold our easy, just reward who never went Your unenlightened way to work."

They reap; we are content.

Due to the limitations with emailing and the size of the list of trophies, I will be sending a brochure out separately and you should receive this in the next couple of days.


If you are interested in taking part, this is how to go about it:


